PLANS COMING FOR THE YACHT

HONGKONG MARU TO BRING THEM AND WORK WILL BEGIN AT ONCE.

The plans for the new yacht that will represent Hawaii in the coming ocean race next year, are due on the Hong Kong Maru tomorrow. As soon as the plans arrive, work on the new cup defender will be started as the contract calls for the yacht to be in commission on May the first.

In the mail a short time ago the designer Crowninshield of Boston stated that he hoped the plans would be ready to be delivered by the middle of September. Sorenson and Lyle will build the new vessel, although the contract has not been signed as yet.

The new yacht will be the latest of the designers' creations and should prove to be very fast in every way, as she is modelled on the lines of one of the fastest schooners running out of Boston today. Crowninshield has taken into consideration the weak points of the best yachts on the Pacific, and has overcome some of the weak points of the Tartar, and the new yacht should be very seaworthy as well as fast.

The race next year will be the second Pacific Ocean race and everyone on the coast is looking forward to it with a good deal of interest.

The Larline which won the race last year, is being overhauled and put in the best of condition, and her owner, Mr. Sinclair, is in hopes that the trophy that means so much in yachting will go to him again, but his yacht will have to sail fast, if she wants to win from the new un-named Hawaii yacht. Money for the new yacht is coming in rather slowly, but the committee have no fears that all the money will be in long before the time of the launching.

embezzlement against him. The charge he must answer to is the mutilation of the kerosene oil warehouse receipts.

This morning a friend of Mayer, manager of the agency of the Standard Oil, stated that Breckons was confident that he had a case against Mayer. A cable was received from New York, by the steamship's master, instructing him to turn the business over to a certain firm, which was done. Hart got very indignant and wrote the firm a letter saying he would not be responsible for the captain's acts. Incidentally he put a bill to the captain for \$15, alleging to be back-hire. The captain denied the bill, but paid it to get rid of Hart.

CRUISERS' TIME OF DEPARTURE

THE BIG FOUR MAY CUT OUT SAN FRANCISCO AND GO TO SEATTLE.

The Big Four will leave their respective docks on Thursday morning at eleven o'clock, and will start on the last lap of their round the world trip unless something unexpected happens to change the Admiral's plans. One of the officers stated today that it was possible but not probable, that the ships would remain over until Monday, as influence was being brought to bear on the Admiral to stay for Regatta Day. The ships are not positive about going to San Francisco on account of the health conditions of that port, and cables have been sent to the department in Washington from the Admiral asking what to do in the matter. If San Francisco is not the port Seattle will no doubt be chosen, as a good deal of work is to be done on the ships, and the Navy Yard at Bremerton is suited for that work.

CONTRACT AWARDED.

Superintendent C. S. Holloway, of the Department of Public Works has awarded the contract for construction of the court house at Waiuku to A. P. McDonald, of this city, whose bid of \$23,312.50 was the lowest of the two bids submitted and opened yesterday, as reported in yesterday's Star. By the terms of the contract the building is to be completed within 120 days. The building will be of concrete construction.

HILO WILL SEND A WHARF PETITION

OBJECTS TO GOVERNOR FREAR CALLING \$20,000 ITEM OUT OF THE LOANS.

C. R. Buckland, editor of the Hawaii Herald, arrived on the Mauna Loa this morning, to look after Trans-Pacific Trade, which was mysteriously deserted by Tomlina and Pittenger, whom Buckland left in charge. Buckland found the business affairs of the concern all right, and is at a loss to understand why the young men left as they did. He reports Hilo expecting work soon on her breakwater and new railroads, and anticipating good business growth.

"There will be a petition from Hilo in the matter of the \$20,000 wharf appropriation which the governor turned down," said Buckland. "The news that the item was to be left out of the proposed new loan stirred Hilo a good deal and there will be a petition on the subject here soon."

CONVICT PICNIC

The convicts sent from Oahu jail to work on a new road at the Volcano have settled near the crater now, and are having a comparatively nice time. They have a temporary building as a camp, and will occupy it for some time. Hawaii county is standing the extra expense, for the sake of getting the road. The convict camp observes prison discipline and the men have to work prison hours, but it is nicer to be in a camp at the volcano than in Oahu jail, and the men will have a task of interest in cutting through the forest to make the new road. "The proposed road will make one of the finest drives in Hawaii," said C. R. Buckland this morning. "As it has been surveyed the road leaves the government road where the old trail starts for Kilauea-Iki. Then through forest, by Kilauea-Iki and the seven craters, it goes to close to Halemau-mau. There will be an eight-mile drive of the most attractive kind and it will enable people to visit the crater without making the climb they have to make now.

"The report of a Mauna Loa outbreak last Tuesday is confirmed. Mr. Cant of the Mohogany Lumber Company told me that he saw the smoke distinctly and that it came from near Dewey crater. The smoke was also seen from Hilo."
