LUNALILO ESTATE REPORT APPROVED

TRUSTEE W. O. SMITH'S ANNUAL ACCOUNT OF THE AFFAIRS OF THE ESTATE.

Judge De Bolt yesterday approved the 26th annual account of W. O. Smith, managing trustee of the estate of W. C. Lunailo, deceased. The court also ordered the sum of \$400.78, the net proceeds of the sales of the property of the Hawaiian Fruit and Taro Company, be credited to the principal of the loan of \$4000 due from said company, and the balance charged off, and account closed.

The report shows that the income of the estate for the year ending the 31st day of July, 1907, was \$26,654.05. The expenditures and investments of same period were \$24,925.53, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,728.52.

The general expenses of Lunailo Home for year is given at \$11,116.67, and of the estate, \$2,017.69, or a total of \$13,134.36. The income for year was \$11,169.25, leaving a deficit of \$1,965.11.

The statement shows an "unfortunate loan of \$4000," to the Hawaiian Fruit and Taro Co., which property when sold at auction realized only \$640.78. This however was a legacy from former trustees.

In reporting on the Lunailo Home the expense for care and maintenance for 1905-1906 was \$11,635.87, against \$11,116.67 for 1906-1907, a decrease of \$519.80.

Average daily attendance for past year was 54.85 against 59.00 for previous year. Cost per capita has been \$202 against \$197.21 for previous year.

The report of Mrs. E. W. Weaver, manager of the Home, shows inmates to number of 52, 32 being males and 20 females. The number of death for the year was 11, all males, due to old age. Three males were discharged. The ages at death of the 11 were between 60 and 80 years of age. An increasing number of tourists have visited the Home.

The total value of the estate is given at \$214,135.42.

THE LEGISLATURE WILL "LAY FOR" THEM

SUPREME COURT DECIDES THAT NATIONAL BANK STOCKS ARE EXEMPT FROM TAXATION BUT DELICATELY HINTS AT NEED OF A LAW WHICH WILL REMEDY THE MATTER.

"National Bank stocks are not 'public stocks' and cannot be classed as such," is the ruling of the Supreme Court in a decision given this morning in the appeal of the Tax Assessor against a ruling of the Tax Court in the cases of Cecil Brown and M. P. Robinson.

The Assessor included shares in the First National in making assessments against Brown and Robinson, and they appealed and won in the Tax Court. The Assessor appealed to the Supreme Court, and the latter affirms the lower court. The court says:

"There appearing to be no statute of this Territory taxing National Bank shares in accordance with law, it is unnecessary to discuss any other question submitted."

This decision of the Supreme Court means that the First National Bank of Honolulu, as well as the National Bank at Walluku, Maui, escape any taxation whatever either on their stock or personal property, and will continue to so escape until the Territorial taxation laws can be amended. From the First National Bank alone this loss will mean to the Territory something between \$4,000 and \$6,000 per year.

This condition of affairs comes about from the fact that under the Federal statutes national banks cannot be taxed on their personal property or assets aside from real estate. Under the Territory tax laws as they stand at present, all taxes upon shares of stock in corporations must be levied on the corporation, and not upon individuals holding the stock.

RESTORER WORKS ON CABLE BREAK

CABLE REPAIR STEAMER IS NOW ENGAGED IN MAKING REPAIRS NEAR GUAM.

S. S. Restorer, the Commercial Pacific Cable Co.'s cable ship, is still at work on the repair of the cable near Guam, the local office being aware of the fact through the Midway station which notes the tests.

The Restorer found the fault in the cable yesterday afternoon and to the extent that her tests drew the attention of the Midway operator, was in communication with that station.

There is at present no way of learning the nature of the trouble with the cable. Should the Restorer complete repairs today she will be back in Honolulu the last of the month.

CIVICS MEETING. A committee of the Civic Federation Society is holding a meeting at the office of Sheriff Iaukea this afternoon to discuss the matter of juvenile offenders in the Police Court. As was mentioned exclusively in the Star the other day the Civics are against juveniles being put in the same place of detention as the older offenders. The matter will be probably decided this afternoon and the first steps for improvement will be made.

APPEAL LOST. The appeal in the case of the Wo Sing Co. vs. Y. Akau was decided this morning by the Supreme Court. The appeal was from a jury-waived judgment for \$41.89. The principal ground of appeal was that the written decision of the Circuit Court did not contain findings of fact. The Supreme Court overrules the appeal holding that the law "does not require the decision of a Circuit Court in a jury waived case to contain special findings of fact."

Ah Choy, the "Cane-field of the Chinese gamblers" was fined \$20 and costs for his desire and love for the wheel of fortune. Choy has been before the court a number of times before for the same charge and this time the fine will probably be the means of his curbing his passion in the different games of chance.

L. Spence and B. Barnum, two marines from the local naval station, had a lively set to with a Japanese hack driver yesterday, and as a result the Jap's eyes were not as bright as they might have been. The two defendants were represented by Attorney Strauss, who entered a plea of guilty and asked the court for clemency, as the men would be well punished when they returned to the Navy yard. This the court did not approve and they were each fined \$15 and costs for their rough-housing on the Jap.

Three men and two women were disturbing the quiet of the night in the vicinity of the Winston block were each fined \$4 and costs. F. Ottmeyer, a little short man who has been stealing the "morning milk" for some time from the different restaurants, was called before the bar of Justice this morning to answer to the charge. He was evidently very much pleased with the idea of getting some free meals for some time in the County boarding-house, as all the time that he was in court he had a smile on his face that would have taken a good deal to come off. When asked why he stole milk he answered that he was hungry, and that whenever he felt hungry he was always looking for a chance to steal something. "I have been doing this for some time," he said, "I am not sorry as I wanted it very much." His capacity for milk must be a very good one, as he had stolen two big five gallon cans for two mornings straight, this morning being the last as he was in the act of drinking the milk when he was caught by one of the officers of the law. He was given 60 days and seemed to enjoy it much, as he left the court room smiling very brightly.

MRS. CONNOLLY DEAD. News was received here yesterday of the death of Mrs. Louis Ghdys, Gresley Connolly, formerly of this city and the wife of Captain Connolly, U. S. A. Mrs. Connolly was the sister of Nigel Jackson and Sidney Jackson of this city and of George, Lionel, Algernon, Ethel and Laurelot Jackson and Mrs. J. W. Hale. Mrs. Connolly was twenty-two years and one month old at the time of her death, which occurred on September 27, at San Antonio, Texas. She was a native of Honolulu and left here when a child.

LOCKJAW CASE CURED. NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—Viral tetanus has been cured by the doctors of the Williamsburg Hospital. There are, it is said, only two other similar cures on record.

Mrs. Annette Koesting was apparently in the first stages of lockjaw six weeks ago from a wound from a rusty nail. A council of physicians agreed that her case was hopeless. Nevertheless, antitoxin was injected daily. The treatment began to show signs of success about a week ago. Mrs. Koesting will soon leave the hospital.

JOHN BLISS DEAD. John H. Bliss, a retired capitalist of Pennsylvania, died suddenly at the Moana hotel last night, of heart disease. He was 84 years of age and had made his home here on account of his health. He had made many friends here and will be much missed. The remains have been cremated, for shipment to Erie, Pennsylvania, where he had several children and grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

DEATHBER CONFESION FREES. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 16.—After having served 13 years of a life sentence in San Quentin Penitentiary, it has developed that William Evans is innocent. Proof that he did not commit the burglary for which he was sentenced is in the hands of the authorities.

The Judge who passed the sentence declares Evans is guiltless, as did the prosecuting witness on his death bed. Evans will be allowed to leave the penitentiary shortly. He was convicted in Amador County.

GOES TO NEWCASTLE. British S. S. Wandor, Captain Walters, now discharging 2500 tons of guano from Pleasant Island at the railway wharf, expects to get away on Wednesday for Pleasant or Ocean Island and to load guano for Sydney, New South Wales. From Sydney she goes to Newcastle, N. S. W., to load coal for Honolulu. She is taking aboard fuel forward while she is finishing discharge aft.

APPEAL SUBMITTED. In the Supreme Court this morning the case of the Territory vs. Ah Sing was up on writ of error, and submitted after a brief argument by F. M. Prosser for the Territory. Attorney Breckons for the defense submitted the case without argument. The court adjourned until next Monday morning at 10 o'clock.
