DESERTIONS FROM THE CRUISERS HERE

MANY SAILORS TRIED AND FAILED AND TRIED AGAIN IN SAN FRANCISCO.

SAN FRANCISCO, October 8.—The cruiser Charleston, Rear Admiral Swinburne's flagship, the cruiser St. Louis and the torpedo boat destroyers Preble and Perry sailed at noon yesterday for Magdalena bay, where the second squadron will engage in target practice on an extensive scale. The four cruisers that arrived recently from the Asiatic squadron now have man of war row all to themselves and they will not be there long.

The Maryland and Colorado will leave the bay today for aMre Island where they will be coaled. When the bunkers have been filled they will return to their present anchorage and the West Virginia and Pennsylvania will go to the navy yard for fuel. When all the ships have been coaled, which will be about Friday, the squadron will take its departure for Santa Barbara.

The length of the squadron's stay at the southern port has not been decided, but if the people of Santa Barbara do not appoint too many committees of entertainment Admiral Dayton, who cares for only one kind of fighting may learn to like the place and make an extended stay.

One reason given for the squadron's hurried departure is the fact that desertions have been numerous since the ships arrived here. The Colorado is said to have lost an unusually large percentage of its men nearly every liberty party having been shorn of a few. Several of the Colo-

rad's men tried to desert at Honolulu but the size of the place was too limited to make hiding easy and the island police returned every man to the ship. It is said that 45 general court martials followed the short stay at Honolulu.

The local launchmen learned Sunday that the new law which brings their boats under the supervision of the government inspectors is something more than a matter of form. Hardly had the crowds assembled that wished to visit the battleships than government inspectors put in an appearance. Boatmen not provided with licenses were not allowed to operate launches carrying passengers and the number of passengers carried was limited in every case to the number of life preservers on board.

This regulation is said to have hit Boatman C. A. McNeill rather a heavy blow. McNeill came over from Tiburon to share in the harvest and brought three boats with him. He had sold many tickets when the inspectors appeared and limited him to 11 passengers a boat. The crowd holding tickets demanded their money back and, in the process of liquidating, McNeill discovered that some thirty forger had duplicated his tickets so cleverly that until McNeill ran out of cash the bogus pasteboards looked as good to him as the tickets he had issued.

The following new rules for hand ball have been adopted and every day the game is played on the courts of the Y. M. C. A.:

1. A fault is made when a served ball (1) Strikes the front wall, outside the red boundary lines. (2) Strikes the front wall and goes over the side-wall, back-wall or side-lines. (3) Strikes in front of ace or service line.
2. A hand-out is made (1) By making two faults, (2) By ball touching floor, ceiling, side-walls or partner before striking front wall. (3) By batting ball with closed hand, or with both hands, or dropping it and not serving on first bounce or dropping it with one hand and batting with other hand. (4) By touching the ball after serving it, before it bounces twice on floor or opponent has played it. (5) By not returning ball direct to front wall, before or after it touches the floor the first time, after your opponent has returned it. (6) By server stepping across ace or service line with both feet before ball strikes front wall (Except Hindrance Rule).
3. A hindrance is made (1) By blocking your opponent's way. (2) By ball touching any apparatus inside of boundary lines. (3) By ball touching an opponent before striking front wall or before bouncing on way to front wall.
4. A ace or one point is scored if opponent does not return the ball direct to front wall, before or after it touches the floor first time, or bats the ball with closed hand or both hands (Except Hindrance Rule).
5. A server's partner must be in box when ball strikes front wall from service.
6. A set of players should not play more than three games of eleven points each when others are waiting.
7. To settle a disputed point, (without referee) play is over.

WATERHOUSE'S TRIP FOR "RUBBERING"

WILL VISIT FAMOUS RUBBER LANDS IN OUT OF THE WAY PLACES.

F. T. P. Waterhouse, in speaking of his contemplated trip to the rubber lands in the Malay Peninsula, stated that he expected to leave with his wife on the Asia on the 14th of November and would go first to Hongkong. From there he would tranship to a steamer for Singapore. From Singapore he would take a coasting steamer to Muar Tanjong Olok plantation in the State of Johore, a few miles up the river from Muar, and is next to one of the largest rubber plantations in the world owned by the Pears of soap fame. After he had spent some time in looking over the ground and the industries in other parts of that state, he would go to Pahang, where the largest rubber plantation in the world is situated.

"Both these rubber companies are owned by local capital," said Waterhouse, "and it will be my first trip to that part of the world. I am very glad to be able to study an industry that in time will be one of the largest industries in the world. I will probably be away for four or five months. After I finish looking over the plantations that I am interested in, I will continue on to Ceylon where I am going for the Government to look over the plantation there."

TO BREAK GRIP OF THE MORMONS

FRANK CANNON, SON OF A CHURCH LEADER AT HEAD OF THE MOVEMENT.

WASHINGTON, October 6.—Born in polygamy, his father, George Q. Cannon, having once been a prominent leader in the Mormon church, Frank J. Cannon ex-United States Senator from Utah, has become head of a determined agitation to break down the political power of Mormonism in the Western States. In a letter to Ellis E. Beebe, one of the organizers of the Silver Republican party, and now of New York Cannon tells of plans by which he and others expect to destroy what he terms "an effective contract between the Republican leaders and the Mormon hierarchy."

While present conditions exist in Utah and other States, Cannon declares there is no chance for Democratic success. "Not even if his name were placed in nomination by a Southern Democrat do I think that the President would accept a nomination," said Mr. Root. "President Roosevelt will not be the candidate of the Republican Party. He had made a plain statement to that effect, and even if he desired he could not afford to accept a renomination. It is true that from sections there are requests that the President allow his name to be presented, but this will not be the case. He will not be the candidate."

SUCCESSION TO CHINESE THRONE

PARAMOUNT TOPIC IN GREAT ORIENTAL EMPIRE—DOWAGER EMPRESS VERY INFIRM.

PEKIN, Sept. 12.—The question of the Manchuria succession, native officials assert, has become the paramount topic of the deliberation at the Summer palace. One of the ablest foreign authorities says that more urgent than a constitution for China or the amalgamation of the opposing Chinese and Manchus is the question of an heir apparent which the Dowager Empress, the greatest of all Manchus, clearly identifies with the continuance and security of the dynasty.

The question has not been raised since the time subsequent to the Dowager's deposing of Prince Chun's son, Pu Chun, in accordance with the protocol of 1901, when the majority of the Imperial clan reaffirmed loyalty to Pu Chun. This action caused a dangerous scandal and was regarded as an affront to the powers, threatening a renewal of the complications. A price was placed on Chun's head, the clan was denounced and its activity suppressed.

The urgency of the question of the succession and the difficulty of its settlement is serious, owing to the infirmities of the Dowager Empress, due to old age, which are complicated by threats of apoplexy and also by the condition of the Emperor, who constantly is reported to be ill. He is said to be the victim of a decline which adds to the possibility of an accident

NEW USE FOR THE WIRELESS

POOLROOM GAMBLERS USED INVISIBLE METHODS OF TRANSMITTING RACE RESULTS.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 30.—A wireless outfit, which the police believe was used for transmitting racing news to the poolrooms of New York City, was seized in a cottage near the Sheephead Bay race track yesterday. Two men were arrested in the apartments. The fact that the race track managers withheld racing news for a stated period, in order to make it of little value to poolrooms has led to many ingenious schemes to get the coveted information. The wireless method is the latest. A cottage overlooking the track was hired and experts, with the aid of a powerful telescope collected such information as was desired. As the telephone and telegraph wires in the vicinity of the tracks were closely guarded, the wireless system was resorted to by the poolroom agents to get the news through the city.
