GLEASON'S WALLACH ANSWER A FAILURE

ST. LOUIS BASEBALL CAPTAIN INTIMATES THAT WOODS "KNOCKED" HIS ARRANGEMENTS.

The following letter was received this afternoon by The Star from Captain Pat Gleason of the Saint Louis baseball team:

"Owing to the continued criticism of the St. Louis team and myself about the projected game with the Coast team, I am compelled, much against my inclination, to set forth the facts. Sunday last I was approached by Mr. Fisher at the ball grounds with a proposition to play a game on the return of the team from Hilo on the basis of 75 per cent and 25 per cent; this was a simple business proposition and nothing was said or thought of in connection with a benefit. I told him that I would talk the matter over with the team. On Monday I saw him and told him that the team would play on the 60 per cent Coast, 40 per cent St. Louis basis. This he would not consider. On Tuesday I again saw him and a virtual agreement was made on a basis of 70 per cent Coast, and 30 per cent St. Louis. Meanwhile Mr. Fisher went to consult his team and returned with the proposition to play

"Two Highways to Hell!"




NEW YORK, November 19.—General William Booth, founder and head of the Salvation Army, addressed a great audience that filled Longacre Square. It was an informal open air farewell. General Booth said, in part:

"God values us because we are His property. We are His by right; He made us; we are products of His skill and He prizes us accordingly. I think there are two highways to hell—one of presumption and one of despair. I wonder sometimes that God does not sweep away these men and women for their presumption and their persistent clinging to evil. But God loves them for the very pain and anxieties they cause Him."

The address of the veteran leader was mainly a recapitulation of Salvation Army work, and it abounded in anecdotes and incidents. General today.

LUCANIA MAY BE ON THE PACIFIC



A Liverpool dispatch published in The Star the day before yesterday here on the same day was a passenger who confirmed the statement, stating that he had understood that the Lucania and Campania, only a few years ago first-class Atlantic ocean greyhounds, were to be sent to this side. The passenger in question stated that the Cunard company was already arranging its offices and agents in the Far East. Nothing was said about the steamers calling at Honolulu and it is most probable that the company's plans, assuming the reports to be true, contemplate following the northern route taken by the Empress boats from Vancouver to Yokohama.

A REVIVAL OF THE IMMIGRATION

HUNDRED AND TWENTY-FIVE GOT PASSAGE NOVEMBER TWELFTH AND HUNDREDS OF OTHERS WANTED TO COME—FIRST LOT TO COME HERE TOOK BACK GOOD REPORTS AND THE MOVEMENT IS SPREADING.

MANILA, November 12.—A party of 125 Filipinos who are emigrating to Hawaii for work on sugar plantations will be sent to Mariveles this morning for quarantine prior to going aboard a liner for transportation to Honolulu. At the office of the San Fernando Mess on Calle Anloague several hundred anxious Filipinos were gathered all day yesterday trying to get their names among those to be sent. Those who are to go have all been fitted for heavy clothing and will go aboard well prepared for strenuous weather.

George Wagner is in charge of the work of engaging the natives for their new homes. Several women are among those to go.

The Cabiene-American says: "Quietly and gradually an emigration to Hawaii of Filipino laborers is being worked up. A year and more ago the Planters' Association of Hawaii sent out a shrewd lawyer, A. F. Judd, as its agent, to smooth the way for the obtaining of as many thousands of Filipinos for work in the cane fields there, as could be induced to go. Judd spent six months in Manila, and overcame the legal difficulties, as also he made allies and friends of the government. He represented that the more Filipinos who learned the modern methods of caring for su-

gar cane as practiced in Hawaii, and who returned to these islands, the more teachers there would be for the mass of field laborers here. His ideas chimed in with those of the Commission and the bureau chiefs interested, and everything was done for him that could aid his project.

"He himself however, was unable to get more than a score or two of natives to sail for Hawaii, as his stay was limited and was mainly confined to paying the road for a labor agent. He left this agent behind and by dint of strenuous efforts he has gotten together 125 laborers who are to go today. Many more are offering, so that it would appear he will have no trouble in shipping all he wants. Their willingness to go is largely due to the statements of Filipinos who went in the first lot to Hawaii and who have been sent back here to induce their friends to become emigrants. It is said that the laborers are well treated in Hawaii.

"The pity is that the energies used to prepare for the journey to Honolulu cannot be used on Philippine soil where every laborer possible is needed. Hawaii which is struggling in the grasp of nearly a hundred thousand Japanese who dictate wages and hours, has no greater necessity for willing toilers than have these islands."
