**SCHOONER LUKA IS A BANKRUPT**

SELLS AT AUCTION FOR LESS THAN THE VARIOUS CLAIMS AGAINST HER.

Schooner Luka was sold in front of the Judiciary Building at noon today by order of the U. S. District Court. Four hundred dollars was the price paid and C. Meinecke was the purchaser. The money was handed over. Out of this money the costs of the proceedings are supposed to be taken, the costs of court being taken out first under any circumstances.

Japanese sailors who worked the famous schooner between Laysan Island and this port have had a claim in for \$350, wages, and, at present outlook, it is not apparent where their money is coming from. The Japanese consul put up a bond to secure the sailors and it seems now that no one will get much out of the deal.

There were several bidders for the schooner. Young Brothers were among them. The bidding started at \$200 and stuck at \$400.

**TOLOSAN EVEN.**

S. S. Tolosan is now on an even keel. All day yesterday stevedores from McCabe, Hamilton & Renny, were working on cargo to right the German steamship which came in here in distress on Tuesday with a dangerous list to port and cargo and coal have now been so shifted that, if anything other than on an even keel, she lists a bit the other way, to starboard. The Tolosan will be brought to a wharf to fill her bunkers and some of her cargo may be discharged.

**SAD NEWS AWAITS COL. SPAULDING**

WIFE HE IS HURRYING TO SEE PASSED AWAY ON WEDNESDAY NIGHT.

The death of Mrs. Z. S. Spaulding of Kealia, Kauai, whose husband left on the Alameda last Wednesday, was announced yesterday by cable from Los Angeles. Col. Spaulding went in answer to a cable stating that she was seriously ill, and she died about midnight of Wednesday, when he was less than a day at sea.

The deceased had long been an invalid. She was born in Honolulu in March, 1847, and was the eldest daughter of the late Captain and Mrs. Makeo. She was married to Col. Spaulding about thirty-five years ago. Five children survive, two sons and three daughters. The sons are Rufus and James Spaulding. The daughters are Mrs. Brodero, the Countess Senn, and the Countess Bonzi.

She was a sister of Mrs. E. D. Tenney, Mrs. Noonan, Mrs. Dr. George Herbert, Mrs. Hastings, Mrs. Clarence W. Macfarlane and Charles Makeo.

The cable announcing her death made no statement regarding funeral arrangements or the place of interment.

**BIGAMIST READY TO QUIT EARTH**

ACCUSED OF MARRYING TWICE IN TWO WEEKS, SAYS GRAVE IS ONLY THING LEFT.

ST. HELENA, December 22.—It was through a marriage bureau that pretty Celeste Marr met A. F. Winfrey, now in jail in Napa on a charge of bigamy. It was through the proverbial absence of mind of man in matters relating to mail of feminine members of the household that permitted the alleged bigamous marriage to be solemnized. These facts were gained today by an interview with the Marrs at their home.

Winfrey learned of Miss Marr while in Denver. Though on December 6 last in that city he had married Miss Mattie M. Mathews, he arranged to come to California. He arrived in San Francisco with his bride on December 14. One of his first acts, so his wife No. 1 says, was to call up Miss Marr over the long distance telephone and talk to the girl in her presence. He explained that Miss Marr was a friend, and then told her he was going to Napa "for his health."

While he was away Mrs. Winfrey looked through his effects and discovered letters written by Miss Marr. This disclosed the engagement and Mrs. Winfrey divined the real purpose of his trip to Napa.

She promptly wrote to Miss Marr's mother, explaining everything. The son of the household got the letter from the postoffice, but forgot to give it to his mother until after the wedding had been performed.

The next development was the arrival of Mrs. Winfrey in St. Helena. Winfrey refuses to admit his guilt, but today made this significant statement:

"I guess the best thing for me to do is get off the earth."
