Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu. Honolulu standard time is 10 hours 20 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m. which is the same as Greenwich, 9 hours, 9 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

**WEATHER BUREAU.**  
The following data, covering a period of 33 years, have been compiled from the McKibbin and Weather Bureau records at Honolulu, T. H. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month in question, for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

Mean or normal temperature 71 deg. The warmest month was that of 1895 with an average of 72 deg. The coldest month was that of 1905 with an average of 67 deg. The highest temperature was 84 deg. on the 19th, 1891. The lowest temperature was 54 deg. on the 27th, 1895.

**PRECIPITATION.**  
(Rain, 29 years, 1878-94, 1905-7.)  
Average for the month, 3.53 inches. Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 13.  
The greatest monthly precipitation was 12.44 inches in 1907. The least monthly precipitation was 0.17 inch in 1878. The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 5.20 inches on the 25th, 1878.

## COMPLAINT MADE OF "KNOCKING"

HOTEL MEN SAID TO TRY TO DISUADE TOURISTS FROM GOING TO VOLCANO.

At the regular weekly meeting of the Promotion Committee held yesterday afternoon Chairman Waldron in very emphatic words declared that the hotel managers here were persuading the tourists not to visit other islands and more especially knocking the Volcano trip. "From Alexander Young down, the hotel managers of Honolulu are dissuading tourists from taking the inter-island trips," this remark made by Chairman Waldron was apparently shared by all the members present with the exception of Willard E. Brown, who remarked that he did not think that Mr. Young personally was knocking the trip.

W. T. Lucas stated that "Manager Childs of the Hawaiian is one who I know is doing all that he can to keep people from going to the Volcano," quoting A. C. Baumgartner of San Francisco who came very near giving up the trip on account of the knocking that he had heard, but who finally made the trip with a party of friends and remarked on his return that he would not have missed it for anything.

Palmer of the Waterhouse Trust Co. agent for Volcano tickets, was another quoted by one of the members as stating that he had been ordered to keep out of the hotel lobbies, and not to attempt to interest the guests with any of the outside trips.

J. A. McCandless made a motion in which he stated that he thought the matter lay entirely within the jurisdiction of the committee, and that a letter should be sent to Mr. Young calling his attention to the facts and asking him what the policy of the hotel managers really was in the matter. The motion was seconded by J. L. McLean and passed.

Quite a number of interesting letters were read at the meeting among them being one from the Los Angeles representative of the committee, stating that he was doing all in his power to get the proposed high school excursion here in the near future.

Alexander Young denies having done any "knocking" and calls attention to his published booklet widely circulated which gives enthusiastic descriptions of the Volcano.

## WASHINGTON, January 24.—

**TAKAHIRA NEXT MONTH.**  
WASHINGTON, January 24.—Ambassador Takahira, who has been appointed to succeed Baron Aoki, is expected to arrive here to take up his official duties on February 15.

To arrive at the capital on the date given the new ambassador will have to take some other route from Japan than that touching Honolulu. The Pacific Mail liner Korea is due here on February 8 and is the only steamship touching here from Japan on which the Ambassador could arrive approximately on the date stated.

**REPUBLIC IN PORTUGAL.**  
LISBON, January 24.—The government has discovered and frustrated a plot to overthrow the throne and establish a republican form of government for Portugal. Forty conspirators, implicated in the plot, have been arrested.

**FAMOUS COMPOSER IS DEAD.**  
NEW YORK, January 24.—Edward A. MacDowell, composer and pianist, whose orchestral works have been given in all the important cities of America and Europe, died here yesterday.

**TO CONTINUE WAR ON STANDARD OIL**

CHICAGO, January 15.—Armed with instructions and data against the Standard Oil Company, from which he demands \$80,000,000 more in fines, United States District Attorney Sims returned from Washington today to prosecute the cases. He had passed a week in the Capitol, conferring with Attorney General Bonaparte on the best way to secure a conviction of the company which already is under \$29,240,000 fine for rebating.

Attorney Sims announced that he would try the 4000 remaining counts against the Standard Oil Company as soon as they are reached on the court docket beginning early next week. The company is liable to a fine of \$20,000 on each of the 4000 counts pending. No effort will be made to call any of the cases until Attorney John S. Miller, who is at the Walsh trial, is at liberty. This will be next week.

Mr. Sims said he was confident that his office would be allowed additional appropriations asked for the employment of two additional assistants and other office help to aid in the war on the Standard. It is believed Judge Landis will hear the case, although in view of his \$29,240,000 fine, the Rock-

**BANK ROBBED OF \$740,000.**  
MEXICO CITY, January 8.—Fully \$740,000 is missing from the Bank of Yucatan, according to reports received here from Merida. Following the disappearance of this enormous amount, Fernando U. Rodriguez subdirector, and Mateo Ponce, ex-cashier of the bank with ten other persons, have been arrested.

All of the money missing is said to have been new bank notes and was taken from a strong safe to which there were two keys, one in the possession of the subdirector and the other in the possession of the cashier. Later reports from Merida state that a lawyer, P. G. Ponce and Eduardo Ponce, son-in-law and son, respectively, of the cashier, have also been placed under arrest. In all there have been twelve prominent persons connected with the bank who have been placed under arrest, all of whom are among the most prominent people of Merida.

**POURED HOT LEAD INTO EAR.**  
MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., Dec. 25.—Jas. H. Conkling, a businessman, is lying in a hospital suffering from molten lead, which it is believed he poured into his right ear with suicidal intent.

Mr. Conkling had been in ill health for a few weeks and about a week ago disappeared. Last night a son visited the Conkling store and found his father lying unconscious on the floor. The ear was filled with lead, which had hardened. At the hospital it was found that the drum had been burned away and the inner ear filled.
