ASK \$8,250,000 FOR LONDON WATER

METROPOLITAN BOARD WANTS A GREAT RESERVOIR IN BOURNE VALLEY ON THAMES.

LONDON, Jan. 10.—The metropolitan water board has abandoned for the present the scheme to bring London's water from Wales and will ask parliament to authorize the building, at a cost of £1,850,000 (\$8,250,000), of a reservoir in Bourne valley, to be ten square miles in area and capable of impounding 55,000,000 gallons. It is estimated that this reservoir, by increasing the daily supply of water from the Thames from 129,000,000 gallons to 450,000,000, would provide for all the needs of London until 1960, when the population is expected to reach 16,000,000.

It is proposed by the board to erect a dam half a mile long so made as to admit of its gradual raising in accord-

ance with the growing demand for water, impounding 15,000,000 gallons to begin with. The cost of the initial work is placed at £60 (\$300) for each 1,000,000 gallons stored, whereas, when the artificial lake is complete it will fall to exactly half that amount. The water of the Thames is admittedly somewhat polluted, but the board's experts claim that perfect purity can be secured by filtration.

On the other hand, a considerable party calls the board's reservoir plan a dangerous makeshift and demands Welsh water at once. The board concedes that after London's population goes above 16,000,000 it will be necessary to look to Wales for water and it is seeking power to acquire immediately a watershed in that country large enough to insure the metropolis an adequate supply for the last forty years of the present century.

NICE QUARTERS FOR WALLACH

BOARD OF HEALTH WAS ALL READY, BUT HE BACKED OUT.

The indications that J. Lor Wallach's career as a dealer in the Territory is about pau. He has at the last minute turned down the agreement which the Board of Health had made with the lepers on Molokai, by which he was to be allowed to treat for a year twelve volunteers from the Settlement practically upon his own terms, and entirely without any interference from the Board, except that the Board reserved the right to keep the outer door of the Kalaui Receiving station, where the experiment was to be made, and to require the Female Rock doctor to register his comings and goings. The Board was fitting up

very comfortable quarters for the "doctor," and he was to be allowed all conveniences, telephone, etc. So far as an unprejudiced observer can see, Wallach was to have a free hand in the experiments, with absolutely no interference, the matter of feeding and attendance even of the twelve patients, whom Wallach had a right to select, being entirely in his hands. As has all along been predicted, however, Wallach never had any intention of carrying out his boasted claims, and a great deal of feeling and trouble might have been saved had he been put to the test in the first place instead of such long drawn out opposition. The only good that has come of the agitation is probably in the fact that in the Board of Health has learned a few things, and that when future Wallachs bob up from time to time, instead of opposing them, give them the same kind of conditions that were finally offered in the present instance. In all probability it will work out the same way. The only thing to regret is the disappointment of the lepers themselves, who have thus had their hopes and feelings played upon. It is sure to be a disappointment to them. They seem not to have imagined that

Wallach was not acting in good faith, and had already selected the twelve subjects for the test, subject of course to Wallach's approval.

At the last meeting of the Board of Health, Wallach was given until yesterday at 4 o'clock to sign the conditions. His backers, the "Committee of Ten," has been urging him to sign, but he has steadily declined to do so on one pretext or another. The committee will probably make a final report at a mass meeting to be held next Saturday night, after which it will resign, and Wallach's power over the natives will be broken.

CHINESE MISSION BURNED.
 SHANGHAI, Jan. 9.—Rioters at Kia-Hsing-Fu, in the province of Che-Kiang, have burned the Protestant chapel and school there. The official residence of the local Magistrate also was destroyed. The foreigners at Kia-Hsing-Fu are safe.

The Presbyterian Church South has maintained a missionary establishment at Kia-Hsing-Fu since 1895. The station consisted of two places of worship, three day schools, one boarding school and one dispensary.


