## SPORT NOTES

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# GARBAGE MATTER IS STILL SLEEPING

SUPERVISORS MEET AND TRANSACT ROUTINE BUSINESS AND ADJOURN WITHOUT DISCUSSION.

Last night's meeting of the County Board of Supervisors was a very tame affair. It lasted scarcely half an hour and no noteworthy incident marred the perfect harmony which reigned—at least in so far as surface indications went.

Again the garbage department row was not even mentioned, and it is not dead seems to be taking a good sound nap. It is said that Chairman Huatace is carrying about in his inside pocket a resolution to abolish the garbage department entirely, and to make the Road Department solely responsible for the sanitary condition of the city.

But Huatace nor any other member seemed disposed to start anything they might not be able to stop last night. The routine business of the evening was not of any great importance.

County Engineer Gere recommended that a pile bridge be built across Paumotu gulch, Paupane, to take the place of the present stone grade crossing to cost about \$1,300.

Dwight moved that the bridge be built, and Kealoha seconded it. There was no debate and the motion carried without opposition.

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# WITHDRAW FROM THE PHILIPPINES

A DEMOCRATIC RESOLUTION IN SENATE TO FIX A DATE IN 1912.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—The Democrats in the Senate are putting on their fighting clothes and getting ready to enter the political arena for blood. A number of the Democratic leaders, incensed over the effort to trail the democracy along after President Roosevelt are preparing to individualize the party and give it some character of its own.

Leader John Sharp Williams gave evidence of this in his speech in the House yesterday, in which he outlined some Democratic policies in addition to or in amplification of the Roosevelt policies. Senator Rayner of Maryland is preparing to make a vigorous appeal to the Democracy to stand on its own ground, and other senators are brushing up for a similar effort.

Senator Stone of Missouri wants to bring up the Philippines question as a campaign issue. He introduced a resolution in the Senate today providing that:

"The President is requested on the 10th day of December, 1912—that is to say, fifteen years after the date of the treaty of Paris—to deliver the control and possession of said islands to the authorities representing the people thereof, including also all government property therein pertaining to the administration of such government, and withdraw therefrom immediately thereafter the army and navy of the United States; provided, however, that the United States shall retain on such date and thereafter such suitable coaling and naval stations as in the judgment of the President may seem necessary, and that the delivery of said islands to such native government shall in itself imply the assumption by it of the obligations then existing and incumbent upon the government of the United States, and consequent upon the granting of any franchise, as well as the assumption of all outstanding obligations of the government at that time existing in said islands."

According to the terms of another section of the resolution the President is requested to open negotiations with other nations for the purpose of securing an agreement with them for the neutralization of the Philippine islands and the recognition of their independence whenever it shall be granted by the United States.

The preamble of the resolution sets forth the reasons for the proposed step as follows: "Whereas by virtue of the treaty between the United States and Spain December 10, 1898, the United States established its control over the Philippine Islands; and

"Whereas as a step toward their ultimate independence there was first established by acts of the Philippine commission in 1901 and thereafter a schedule of provincial and municipal governments, which governments in the hands of the Filipinos themselves under an elective system have achieved and maintained order and stability; and

"Whereas, as a further step in the same direction and two years after a proclamation of the complete pacification of the islands, the United States provided for an election of a Philippine assembly, which assembly inaugurated last October is now, as appears from the reports of the Secretary of War, in full and satisfactory operation; and

"Whereas the steps heretofore successively taken have demonstrated and are demonstrating the justice of the claim of the Filipinos for speedy independence and their capacity for self government; and

"Whereas it is frequently urged as a reason for refusing independence to the Philippine Islands that some other nation would seize the islands if the United States abandoned them; and

"Whereas this danger can be removed by an agreement between the United States and the great nations of Europe and Asia, whereby the independence of the Philippine Islands shall be assured and they shall be regarded as neutral territory not open to the occupation of any other nation as the independence of Switzerland has long been secured in Europe; and

"Whereas fidelity to the fundamental principles of government requires that said government should aim to secure and safeguard the independence of said islands."

# CARUSO'S ACCUSER IN POLICE COURT

MRS. H. STANHOPE ARRESTED FOR DRUNKENNESS AND FINED ONE CENT.

NEW YORK, February 12.—Mrs. Hannah Stanhope, whose accusation caused the arrest of Enrico Caruso at the monkey house in Central Park, starting a scandal which proved embarrassing for the famous singer, was in the Police Court today with her half sister, Mrs. Mary Graham, both of them being charged with intoxication and disorderly conduct.

They presented rather a disheveled appearance. The women quarreled on the sidewalk after taking several drinks in a saloon, and a policeman said they abused him when he advised them to go home. Both being fearful the Magistrate fined them only 1 cent each.

Mrs. Stanhope, after complaining to the Central Park policeman who arrested Caruso, avoided appearing in court as a witness, but on a policeman's testimony Caruso was adjudged guilty and fined \$10. Caruso vehemently denied the woman's charge and the Italians here regard her arrest as a vindication of the tenor to some extent.
