U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu. Honolulu standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time of the tides are taken from the whistle blows at 1:30 p. m. which is the same as Greenwich, 0 hours, 0 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, WEATHER BUREAU.

The following data, covering a period of 33 years, have been compiled from the McKibbin and the Weather Bureau records at Honolulu T. H. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month in question for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

TEMPERATURE.

18 years (1890-1907).

Mean or normal temperature, 71 deg. The warmest month was that of 1897, with an average of 74 deg.

The coldest month was that of 1907, with an average of 67 deg.

The highest temperature was 82 deg. on the 17th, 1890; 16th, 1897; 22d and 23d, 1902.

The lowest temperature was 52 deg. on the 16th, 1902.

PRECIPITATION

rain 21 years (1877-94, 1905-7)

Average for the month, 4.59 inches. Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 12.

The greatest monthly precipitation was 14 inches in 1893.

The least monthly precipitation was 0.26 inches in 1906.

The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 8.65 inches on the 27th, 1888.

CHINESE AND EXCLUSION LAW

THE NEW CONSUL SAYS CHINESE MUST WORK TO HAVE IT MUCH MODIFIED.

A reception was given to the new Chinese Consul General for Hawaii at the Chinese United Society's hall on King street, at 1:30 on Saturday. Berger's band was present and rendered good music. After polite bows, introductions and tea drinking, Mr. Wang was invited to address the gathering. He said in part:

"I am glad to meet you here in the Chinese United Society hall of Honolulu at this reception. With your officers and committees, and large membership, you have a great influence among the Chinese of Hawaii. I am also glad to see Mr. Thwing here today, for he is doing good work for the Chinese people of the islands. As a Chinese United Society, you are a very important part of the Chinese of Honolulu. You can add them in many ways. But in case there are any matters that you cannot settle among yourselves, I am here to help you. Call on me at any time you have need. The Chinese government has shown its interest in the Chinese abroad by sending ambassadors and consuls to be ready to assist them. We want to do so. But remember you also have a work to do. You are Chinese, I see your faces, you cannot deny that you are Chinese people. And so you must work for the good of your own country."

"As I said, I want to help you when I can, but I cannot help you in everything. For example, a Chinese met me the other day, and said he had been arrested for peddling fish on the street, and wanted my aid. I cannot attend to such things. The Board of Health of Honolulu has rules for the selling of fish. He who sells fish must keep them, and sell fish in the market, if that is the proper place. You must all try and keep the laws of the country."

"We all would like to see more Chinese come to Hawaii. It would make the business everywhere better. I will do what I can to aid in this matter. I am going to write to the Chinese Ambassador on the question. He has promised to help. This Exclusion Law is very unsatisfactory. It was said at first that it was not exclusion, but only a temporary restriction of Chinese immigration. Some Chinese laborers should be allowed to come to Hawaii. And a new treaty must be made more clear. If the coming of Chinese laborers to America is restricted, the restriction must be made so plain that it will not trouble scholars, merchants and other classes who wish to come."
