LARNACH ADVANCES

A. D. Larnach was this morning commissioned by Attorney General Hemenway, as Second Deputy Attorney General. This is a position which has not been filled since the present administration went into office, the work having been divided between Mr. Hemenway, Deputy Whitney, and Special Officer Sutton, who is also an attorney.

Mr. Larnach has been practicing in the Territory only a few months, having opened a law office after his return from the Stanford University Law school. During this brief time, however, he has made a very favorable impression in judicial circles, and has handled some difficult criminal cases with conspicuous ability.

ECLIPSE OWNERS AND FEDERAL LAW

The Bureau of Navigation, Washington, has instructed the United States District Attorney at San Francisco to at once investigate the charges contained in affidavits in regard to the bad condition of the boats of the American ship Eclipse abandoned at sea nearly a thousand miles from Honolulu on January 11.

United States Shipping Commissioner H. N. Almy, of this port, forwarded, in February last, to the Navigation Bureau affidavits of survivors of the Eclipse, taken here, and the action above noted is the result.

Members of the crew of the Eclipse declared that her boats were rotten and if this is proved the owners of the lost ship will suffer. The U. S. District Attorney at San Francisco will act at once.

J. A. McKittrick, a stockman of Brookfield, Mo., was pinned under the wreckage from a rear end collision at Spanish Lake, fifteen miles north of St. Louis, on April 2. Scalding steam from the passenger locomotive was enveloping him, and to save McKittrick's life Rev. R. C. Allen of Grove City, Pa., cut off the leg with a pocketknife. The amount that the Chicago Railway Company and the Chicago City Railway Company will pay into the city treasury April 10, as the first installment of compensation due under the terms of their franchise, will be \$1,543,299.30 from both companies.

Hon. H. L. Holstein, Speaker of the House in the last Legislature, arrived here this morning on a business trip from Kohala, Hawaii. Mr. Holstein stated that in so far as he knew there has been no sentiment against President Pinkham of the Board of Health, in his district, by either whites or natives.

A suit was filed this morning by Henry Smith, trustee, vs. Raymond Reyes, his wife, and five children, on an unsatisfied judgment of \$1,107.72, of some time standing. The complaint alleges that Reyes transferred certain property of \$3,000 or more in value to his children in order to prevent the judgment from being executed.

Passion Week will be observed by the Christian and Methodist churches in union services. The meetings will be held on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in the Methodist church building, on Beretania avenue; and on the other evenings of the week, in the Christian church, on Alakea street. The pastors will alternate in preaching.

Stanley A. Cutter, a carman in the employ of the Rapid Transit Company, this morning was adjudged a bankrupt by Judge Dole in the U. S. Bankruptcy Court. The schedule of liabilities amounts to \$392.59, consisting of some twenty or more accounts of various merchants and professional men in the city, none of which are over \$100. The assets consisting of household furnishings and wearing apparel amounts to \$116.

In the divorce case of Annie K. Conrad, vs. Joseph E. Conrad, which has been pending since January 23rd, and is based on grounds of desertion and non support, the libellee being alleged to have been living in Kobe, Japan, since 1900, Judge Lindsay yesterday granted an order appointing F. Melchers, of Kobe, an agent to serve the libellee with the papers in the case.


