# THE GLORIOUS FOURTH IN HONOLULU

## TRANSPACIFIC YACHT RACE

(Associated Press Cable to The Star.)

SAN PEDRO, July 4.—The second transpacific yacht race was started promptly at noon today by President Roosevelt. Four yachts—the Hawaii, Lurline, Lady Maud and Gwendolyn II started. Time allowances are as follows: Lurline, scratch; Gwendolyn II, 17 hours, 39 minutes, 56 2-5 seconds; Lady Maud, 8 hours, 9 minutes, 39 seconds; Hawaii, 8 hours, 37 minutes, 30 seconds; computed on the basis of half-hour for each foot of their average length.

## TWELVE SHIPS FOR HONOLULU

CAPTAIN REES ADVISED FROM WASHINGTON THAT FOUR OF THE SIXTEEN BATTLESHIPS WOULD COAL AT LAHAINA—WILL LEAVE THE FLEET AFTER PASSING MOLOKAI—UNKNOWN WHETHER FLEET WILL REUNITE AT HONOLULU OR AT SEA.

Official word has been received from the Navy Department in Washington addressed to Captain Rees, notifying him that four of the battleships in the Atlantic fleet which will leave San Francisco next Tuesday would proceed to Lahaina to coal. Captain Rees, when seen this morning, stated to a representative of the Star, that he had received official word that only twelve ships would be here, and as far as the four were concerned he was unable to say if they would join the others here before leaving on July 23, or whether they would join the rest of the ships at sea. The ships will leave San Francisco on Tuesday at noon, and will arrive here on July 16 at one o'clock in the afternoon. The sixteen ships will keep in squadron formation until the island of Molokai is passed on the morning of the 16th, and they will then separate. Captain Rees was unable to state this morning what four ships would go to Maui.

## PATRIOTIC ADDRESS BY P. C. JONES

INTERESTING EXERCISES HELD AT THE CAPITOL GROUNDS UNDER THE AUSPICES OF THE HAWAIIAN SOCIETY OF SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION—MR. JONES VIGOROUSLY ATTACKS THE COASTWISE LAW SUSPENSION BILL.

"The Glorious Fourth" was saved from being more than ordinarily quiet by the success attending the patriotic exercises this morning in the Capitol grounds, where a large number gathered to listen to the address of the orator of the day, P. C. Jones; to hear again the Declaration of Independence, by Miss Alice Spalding; to hear a Flag essay by a clever Royal school student, and to applaud the patriotic airs played by the Hawaiian band. These exercises, although somewhat impromptu, proved thoroughly successful.

The crowd was late in reaching the business portion of the city and the

parade of the National Guard, which left the armory at half-past eight o'clock, marching through the city by way of Beretania, Nuuanu, King and Fort and back by way of Beretania, was through almost deserted streets. Very few of the Guardsmen appeared later at the exercises in the Executive building grounds.

Here, under the auspices of the Sons of the American Revolution, a very creditable program was rendered, a feature of which was Orator P. C. Jones' attack on the attempt to repeal the Coastwise Shipping laws for the benefit of Hawaii, an attempt which he characterized in forcible language as unpatriotic and un-American.

The bandstand, from which the readings and the oration were delivered, was decorated with the national colors, while the flags flew from the tips of the staffs on the public buildings. Chairs for the gathering had been placed before the stands, these being filled, while a large number stood at one side and behind, where the various speakers could be best heard. On the stand were the following: P. C. Jones, George R. Carter, Dr. Cooper, Miss Alice Spalding, Master Aki, Judge Kingsbury, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Hall, Rev. E. T. Simpson, Hon. W. O. Smith, Lyle Dickey, W. C. Park, Wm. Alexander, Gerrit P. Wilder and a few others.

George R. Carter spoke briefly in introducing Dr. Cooper, the vice-president of the society under whose auspices the program had been arranged. Dr. Cooper had, so stated Mr. Carter, insisted that there should be some incident to mark the day, the day that it was met that all in Hawaii should celebrate, and the proceedings to follow were due to the insistence.

Mr. Carter was followed by Rev. E. T. Simpson, who asked the Divine blessing on the gathering and on the country.

## The Flagship Connecticut Talks To Kahuku

Wireless expert Isbell stationed at the local wireless station at Kahuku Point on the windward side of the island, while listening last night for aerial messages received the following:

"On board U. S. S. St. Louis, 8 p. m.  
"Good evening. Noon position 31° 4' N, 140° 27' W. We have been having fine weather and will eat 4th of July turkey tomorrow. Keep a lookout for the returns of flight tomorrow night. Hope you are having a good time."

Between eight and nine o'clock Isbell could hear very distinctly messages passing to and from the Yankton, Panther, Glacier, Culgoa and St. Louis.

At nine o'clock his receiver picked up the following:  
"Honolulu Wireless Telegraph Co., via M. K. J. G. and E. N. Have arranged with President Hutchins to call H. N., meaning Honolulu station, every evening from 9 p. m. to 9:15 p. m., Honolulu Standard time, beginning July 8."

"Fleet Signal Officer on board U. S. Flagship Connecticut."  
This means that wireless communication has at last been established between Honolulu and the mainland. The Connecticut is at present in San Francisco harbor, and with the assistance of the ships on route for here, it was possible last night for Isbell to catch the sparks from the wireless outfit on the flagship. The Culgoa which left San Francisco late yesterday afternoon was talking last night very frequently with other ships, and every letter could be heard very plainly by Isbell who is always on the watch for air messages.

Isbell sent word this morning to the office on Fort street that he could hear all the ships and some of the coast stations faintly. If atmospheric conditions had been better, Isbell says he would have been able to hear every word from the coast stations last night. Tonight he will watch from seven o'clock on, and he hopes to be able to hear plainly every message that is sent across the aerial space from the California coast stations.
