**HEALTH AGENTS TO BE DROPPED**

For Injudicious Acts Commissions to Deputy Sheriffs Will Not Be Renewed.

**MATTER OF HOME FOR BOYS.**

President Robinson Is Accorded Plenary Authority to Act For the Board.

As the result of yesterday's meeting of the Board of Health it is probable that a number of the outside agents of the Board will lose their positions on July 15. This state of affairs has come through the fact that when licenses for rooming houses and other such institutions have been refused on the ground of insanitary conditions by doctors who are agents of the board, they have been granted by deputy sheriffs who hold the same position. Hereafter only doctors will be appointed except where there are not enough to handle the government business.

Plans for the home at Kailih for the boys who were brought down from the Settlement some time ago were submitted by the Superintendent of Public Works. A report on the site was made to the effect that the Bishop estate was willing to sell the block desired, subject to small leases, for \$750 per acre and would furnish water for the next two years. The matter was placed in the hands of President Robinson for decision.

Halvor Aylre and Dr. W. T. Monarrat were allowed vacations of two months under pay. A report came in from Oahu that typhoid fever was epidemic there and that the origin of the sickness had been traced to the food supply. There have been twenty-one cases in the two camps on the plantation. Laundry licenses were voted to Sam Kee, Kukui street, and to See Duck Tong, on the Paoa Road near Nuuanu.

A motion was made by Dr. Wayson and passed unanimously that President Robinson be delegated the same general authority which had been given by the Board to the former presidents, L. E. Pinkham and Dr. Cofer. President Robinson responded with a few words thanking the members and expressing the hope that the spirit of harmony would be maintained in the board as it had been in the past.

**BRYAN NOMINATED ON FIRST BALLOT**

Democratic Platform Favors Federal Control of Public Lands of Hawaii.

**FOR PHILIPPINE INDEPENDENCE.**

Admission of Asiatics Opposed—Jury Trials Instead of Injunctions.

DENVER, July 10.—William J. Bryan received the nomination for President on the first ballot.

DENVER, July 10.—The Democratic National platform, as adopted yesterday, favors the Federal control of the public lands of Hawaii to the end that they may be held and utilized for the benefit of bona fide homesteaders; the upbuilding of the American merchant marine without taxing the public treasury; recognition of the independence of the Philippines as soon as a stable government can be formed.

The platform opposes the admission of Asiatics, on the ground that they can not amalgamate with the rest of the population, and declares that injunctions should not issue in labor disputes where such a writ could not be employed in the absence of such disputes. In case of the existence of disputes recourse should be had to jury trials.

Bryan, Gray and Johnson were put in nomination for President. The demonstration at the mention of Bryan's name lasted over an hour.

**Address By Dr. Wilcox**

Dr. Wilcox, the new special agent in charge of the Hawaii Experiment Station, spoke at luncheon at the Commercial Club at yesterday. He made special points of the desirability of co-ordination of the farmers and the business men and of the fact that farming was becoming a scientific occupation.

Another thing he emphasized was the expediency of learning how to raise food products from the soil, on the part of people owning any ground

in these islands, so that the Territory might be self-sustaining in the matter of subsistence in case of being isolated by war.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 4.—The American-Hawaiian Steamship Company's steamer Nebaskan is now loading 1000 tons of feed at Portland for San Francisco. She is expected here next Monday and will take on 1600 sacks of beans, a quantity of wine, canned goods and machinery and other east-bound cargo for New York. This is the first vessel under the American-Hawaiian Company's new service by which the Nebraskan and Nevada run coastwise between Salina Cruz and Puget Sound, stopping at San Diego on the upward passage and San Francisco on the return.
