A proposal is being framed for presentation to the Planters' Association and the Inter-Island Steamship Company, to build a 9000-ton passenger and freight steamer for the Honolulu-San Francisco trade. The contract with American-Hawaiian Steamship Company for the carrying of the sugar crop has expired, so that the field is free.

WATER WASTED

IMPOSSIBLE TO STOP A LARGE DAILY LEAKAGE FROM THE MAKIKI RESERVOIR.

The leak in the Makiki reservoir has been located, but it appears that there is hardly any chance of stopping it and a certain amount of the water which is pumped from the artesian wells must be allowed to go to waste for the time being. It has been decided that the leakage comes through the black sand in the reservoir banks and flows down the old Makiki road.

The only way in which this leakage could be avoided would be by relining the entire reservoir which would be a heavy expense and could not possibly be done now, when every drop of water from this source is needed for actual consumption. At the present time, with the water in the reservoir at its low level, the leakage probably amounts to between 10,000 and 12,000 gallons per day, but would be more with a higher level in the big tank.

TAXES WERE LEFT UNPAID

MASTER'S REPORT WANTS WUNDERBERG ESTATE TO PAY FOR NEGLIGENCE.

According to the master's report rendered by John Marcellino in the estate of the Commins minors, Fred Wundenberg, now deceased, should be surcharged with about \$600. The final accounts of guardianship were filed by Mrs. Elsie Wundenberg, executrix of Fred Wundenberg's estate and have called forth comment.

The chief complaint made is that the taxes on the estate had not been paid since 1902. Why this was not done does not appear, but the result, in the shape of \$488.91 for penalties, interest and advertising does. This amount the master believes the guardian should be charged with for his neglect. Considerable sums of money which might have been invested, have been allowed to lie idle, and the master recommends that a fair interest on these amounts should also be surcharged against Wundenberg, making the total amount nearly \$600.

DIAMOND HEAD ROAD REPAIRING

Road Supervisor Tom Cummins stated this afternoon that he would take the Diamond Head road matter up at once and would make a trip to Diamond Head this afternoon and do what he could to place the road in decent shape at once. His department is working up to the very limit of its resources with six streets being macadamized at present. The road department has been cut down from \$15,000 to \$4,000 each month which holds part of the work back and makes it hard to attend to everything at once.

THE COURT MADE HER EAT.

CHICAGO, June 29.—A Waukegan court ordered a woman fed today in spite of herself. Physical force was resorted to to break the self-imposed sixteen-day fast of Mrs. Hary Hunter of Zion City, one of the followers of Adam Thompson, the cult leader sought by the police in connection with the recent death of his wife, Mrs. Louis Thompson, in a forty-day fast. By order of the court and the strength of two nurses and a physician food was to be forced down Mrs. Hunter's throat as she lay in Waukegan hospital and her intention of emulating Mrs. Thompson and endeavoring to do without food for sixty days foiled. At the last moment the proposed desperate remedy proved unnecessary, the woman surrendering and drinking a glass of milk. After she had pleaded in vain for more time than the two hours allowed her to decide whether she would eat voluntarily or be forced to do so.

ACT ON HUSBAND'S PLEA.

The end of Mrs. Hunter's fast approached in a sensational manner after she had been arrested this morning by Sheriff Griffin of Lake county. The sheriff went to Zion City at 8 o'clock this morning after Mrs. Hunter's husband, Judge E. K. Hunter of Burnham, Ill., had made a fruitless attempt to induce her to eat and had finally consented to proceedings being brought against her in the Lake county court in order that she might be examined for her sanity. When she arrived at the house where Mrs. Hunter had been staying he had no difficulty in making the arrest. The woman offered no resistance, but when requested to take a little food said she would rather die first. She astonished the sheriff by quoting several bible texts, which she interpreted as supporting her in her position.

JUDGE AND DOCTOR DEFIED.

Sheriff Griffin took her to Waukegan and on her arrival there she was taken before Judge C. L. Jones in the county court. Judge Jones questioned her briefly and asked her to yield to the persuasions of her husband and others and to take some nourishment. When she refused, he ordered her taken to the Jane McAllister hospital and directed Dr. F. C. Knight to take charge of her. When Dr. Knight made an examination of the woman he immediately arrived at the conclusion that unless her fast, which had been in progress for sixteen days, was broken she might soon die. He told her so and pleaded with her to take some food, but his efforts were as futile as those of Judge Hunter and Judge Jones. She persisted in her effort to defy the laws of nature.

TUBE AS CHANNEL FOR FOOD.

Dr. Knight then issued instructions that the woman should be forced to take food. Three hospital nurses were enlisted as his assistants and with their aid a tube was to be placed in Mrs. Hunter's mouth, despite her struggles. Through this tube milk was to be forced into her mouth. Notwithstanding her long fast the woman was expected to put up a struggle against the efforts of the doctor and the nurses. But ten minutes before the limit of 1 p. m., which had been set by the court as the hour for the enforced meal, Mrs. Hunter took the milk.

The case of Mrs. Hunter will be disposed of tomorrow morning before Judge Jones of the Lake County court. He will hear evidence as to her sanity. Dr. Knight and Judge Hunter both said today that they believed her deranged and Judge Hunter said he was willing that she should be sent to a state institution. The Zion City police learned today that a man who is a follower of Adam Thompson is also supposed to be engaged in a long fast.
