"Resolved, That a committee of three members of this Board of Health, the president of said body to be one, be appointed by the president for the purpose of conferring with the representatives of the United States Public Health and Marine Hospital Service in Hawaii, in the treatment, and the management of the details of the treatment, of all lepers being treated under the regulations recently adopted, said committee to keep a true record of such cases, the symptoms and progress, and to report to this board from time to time as the president may direct."
