

# MORGAN SAYS WILL NOT RUN

PRESIDENT OF THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND THE MAYORALTY NOMINATION—THE MOVE TO DISPLACE HUSTACE AS CANDIDATE AND WHY IT IS BEING WORKED — ROBERTSON WANTS MORGAN TO UNDERTAKE CAMPAIGN.

"Morgan will run" and "Morgan won't run" is the way local politics is being talked today. Morgan has been urged to get into the fight for mayor of Honolulu, but says his health won't allow it. Morgan looks pretty healthy, and his friends don't take the health excuse. In view of his Chamber of Commerce activities of the past year, when some local business men who don't like any of the other announced candidates began to look for a nominee, they fixed upon Morgan.

Morgan said "nit."

But friends of Morgan say today that he will run anyhow. The endorsements of him are certainly strong. "I hope Mr. Morgan will seek the Republican nomination for mayor," said Chairman A. G. M. Robertson of the Republican Central Committee. "I know his views on political matters. They are sound. He and I tried to get the business men of Honolulu to take an active part in politics two years ago. He is a good party man and a consistent advocate of the

straight ticket, which, you know, has always been my hobby. With Morgan for mayor and a strong man on the ticket for sheriff, I believe the Republicans can win out on this island, and will land our supervisors and senators."

When seen by a Star man this morning Morgan stated that he could not take the candidacy. "My health condition would not allow me to undertake a campaign or take the office," he said.

Morgan has, however, a pretty healthy appearance, and some of his friends are urging him to tackle the job.

The argument of the men backing the Morgan movement, some of whom are friendly to Hustace, is that they want an older man on the job. They want someone who will get out and do a lot of entertaining and meet all sorts of visitors, and would think Morgan could take the work.

In the meantime Hustace is landing a lot of the delegates to the convention and Lucas is doing the same and the primary is very near.

# WIFE SLAYER BOUND OVER

GEORGE KALEIKINI, CHARGED WITH MURDER, HAS HEARING IN POLICE COURT—DEAD WOMAN'S SISTER POINTS OUT THE KILLER—WITNESSES POSITIVELY IDENTIFY ACCUSED—BERNARD KELEKOLIO WAS A FREQUENT VISITOR TO TAKE LADIES TO DANCES.

"That is the man! No, I cannot be mistaken—that is the fellow that killed my sister!"

Pretty Mabel Puaoi half rose from her seat in the witness box in police court this morning, in the presence of a large crowd of Hawaiians and a few others, and, directing a trembling but positively accusing finger at the apparently unconcerned and the unshaven man alongside Senator Achi, his counsel, declared that he it was who on Sunday morning last in the yard of the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Kaal, Kapiolani tract, Kalihi, three times shot at and once hit her sister, Emily Pihihana Kaleikini, his wife, so that she died almost instantly from a cruel bullet that had entered her back, perforated the heart and found final lodgment beneath the tender skin of her right breast.

Kaleikini, thick, dry and drooping lower lip, small face, lozenge nose, lobeless ears which sag at the top,

rounded-back head, huge eyes and stupid stare, sat evidently seemingly undisturbed and without any evident consideration of the crime of which he is alleged to be guilty.

Arthur Brown prosecuted, quickly, and Charles Achi defended to the extent of cleverly cross-examining witnesses, though some apparent inconsistencies in evidence between witnesses was nothing, as it appeared, more than a general misunderstanding of the phraseology of those participating in the questions and answers.

For example, when Miss Mabel Puaoi said she was at the back of the house she meant that she was in the yard at the back of the house and when she said the house faced a certain road she had no reference to the road which was evidently the road Achi was considering.

# HONOR AND TRUST FUND

SUCCESS OF INSTITUTION TO AID DESERVING STUDENTS IN THE NORMAL SCHOOL.

Principal Edgar Wood of the Normal School is much gratified at the success of the Honor and Trust Fund in connection with that institution. He spoke of the subject when asked by a Star reporter on the street for any information that might be forthcoming regarding the new term of the school. For particulars of the fund and its administration he referred the reporter to Hon. W. O. Smith, one of its trustees.

Mr. Smith, though very busy in his office, took the time to make the following statement:

"A little over six years ago Professor Wood, conferring with Miss Pope of the Kamehameha Schools faculty and two or three others, called the attention of the trustees of the Charles R. Bishop trust to the great need of some financial assistance to certain deserving young men and young women who desired to attend the Normal school but had insufficient means to support themselves meanwhile.

"It was suggested that if a fund could be obtained from which loans could be made to certain scholars to be approved by the organization, they to pay back the amounts so loaned under certain reasonable regulations, it would be a great help.

"Under the trust deed Mr. Charles R. Bishop provided for substantial annual payments to be made to certain educational institutions and charities, and under one provision of the deed the trustees contributed in April 1902 the sum of \$250 and in May 1903 other contributions were made by individuals amounting to \$550 in addition, which made a total fund of \$1050. The contributors in all were these: Bishop Trust Fund, \$500; C. M. Cooke, \$250; Mrs. S. C. Allen, \$100; U. I. Wells, \$100; T. C. Davies, \$50; Mrs. J. B. Atherton, \$50.

"An organization was then formed under the title of the Honor Loan and Trust Association. The members of the Association consisted of Professor Edgar Wood, Miss Ida M. Pope, Miss Ida Schweitzer, George P. Castle and W. O. Smith. The fund was used in making careful and judicious loans to a number of deserving students.

"There have been two or three meetings each year of the association and detailed statements made in regard to the loans and the amounts paid back. So far the plan has worked admirably and the amounts borrowed have been from time to time returned and loaned again.

"The amounts given in aid of these students have been loans and not gifts and a number of the beneficiaries have obtained responsible positions as teachers and have met their obligations with great fidelity."

# PRECINCT DIVISION

GOVERNOR FREAR PAUSES IN PLAN OF DIVIDING FIRST OF THE FOURTH.

While it was announced some time ago that the boundaries between the First and Second Precinct of the Fourth District would be changed by Governor Frear in his election proclamation which is soon to be issued, there now appears to be some doubt in regard to this. Governor Frear has received a number of protest against the idea, it being held by many that the change is not necessary and also that it will create great confusion, coming at this time.

One thing has already been decided, that the precinct club elections which are soon to be held will be along the old precinct boundary lines and will not take the new lines into consideration even if they are finally decided on.

When asked about the matter Governor Frear said: "I have received a number of protests against the proposed change and am taking them all under consideration. No, it is hardly right to say that there is a likelihood that no change will be made. I am looking into both sides of the question and wish to hear all before any final decision is arrived at."

# JAPANESE ARE INCREASING FAST

BOARD OF HEALTH FIGURES SHOW THAT JAPANESE BIRTHS IN THE TERRITORY DURING THE YEAR ARE MORE IN NUMBER THAN THOSE OF ALL THE OTHER NATIONALITIES COMBINED — "RACE SUICIDE" AMONG AMERICANS HERE.

The manner in which the Japanese are rapidly gaining up not only a foothold but practically the command of this Territory is shown in the statistics of the Board of Health in regard to the births which have taken place in the past year. The number of Japanese born in the Territory is increasing to such an extent that its total is larger than the combined totals of birth for all other nationalities.

The small number of Americans born here is also surprising and shows that President Roosevelt's race suicide alarm was by no means a false one, at least so far as this Territory is concerned. Out of a total of nearly forty-six hundred births which took place between July 1, 1907 and June 30, 1908, there were only one hundred and twenty six credited to parents of American birth. The citizens of the United States have been outstripped in this line by the immigrants from Japan, China, Portugal and Porto Rico, while the Hawaiians born here are of course also well ahead.

The number of males born in the Territory outstrips the number of females in all nationalities, with the exception of the Spanish. Here the number is the same. The British, too, seem to be rather prone to girls and there is not very much difference in the number of the two sexes.
