NOTHING DOING ON FIRST VISIT

ENTERTAINING OF PACIFIC FLEET TO WAIT UNTIL ITS RETURN IN OCTOBER.

There was a meeting of the Pacific fleet reception executive committee yesterday afternoon. It was decided that nothing would be done in the way of official or formal entertainment until the return of the fleet in October. This was at the request of Admiral Swinburne.

At the same time should an occasion arise for anything to be done at the first visit of the Pacific fleet, the various special committees will be prepared for appropriate action.

METZGER BUYS ALL SORTS OF THINGS

Tomorrow morning the American-Hawaiian steamer Mexican should arrive at Hilo with all sorts of things that Contractor D. E. Metzger has been buying for the Hilo Breakwater work, and which indicate some activity with the beginning of next month.

Besides the rails for the Hilo railroad's extension to the quarry in Puna, whence all the rock will be obtained, and for the spur to the dumping point, the Mexican has in her hold material for the construction of the derriek, locomotive cranes and other appliances for handling rock at the quarry and dropping it into the North Pacific ocean.

Among other articles in Metzger's miscellaneous merchandise is a carload of powder. This has been in Hilo since the arrival of the Virginian but it has been kept very quiet because it has an explosive force amounting to approximately 20,000,000 tons, provided it all went off bang at once and its gases were confined, and Metzger did not wish to scare Hilo folks with a knowledge that they were living on the brink of another volcano that would certainly be more disastrous than Halemauau, and would knock a hilo in the ground bigger than Kilauea, Iki.—Hawaii Herald.

AMERICAN SHIP VISITS JAPAN.

CORUNNA (Spain), August 12.—The American schooner Itasca arrived here today. This is the first vessel of the American Government to call at Corunna since the Spanish-American war. The crew of the Itasca was given a splendid welcome on landing. Potes and a regatta were organized in their honor.

KALAKIELA WARM ON THIEVES' TRAIL

Chief of Detectives Jack Kalakiele has a surprise in store for certain adventurous young men who have been trying to put Honolulu in the class of easy towns for robbery.

Sunday or Monday last and for the second time within thirty days the Manoia residence of R. I. Lillie was burglarized.

Kalakiele and his auxiliaries have been on the trail of the thieves since the first raid, but now it is understood from Kalakiele's set jaw and determined brow that these chaps will either cease their pilage or be discovered.

Mrs. Lillie returned from Hilo last week and on Tuesday morning last Mrs. Lillie went to the house and found the lock of the front door out of order. Gaining an entrance she found all in disorder and is reckoning what is lost.

"We will get them soon, now," said Kalakiele this morning.

AN UNEXPLORED SECTION OF HAWAII

HILO, August 27.—"I am going into a practically unexplored country," said Forester Ralph Hosmer on Monday, "into a part of the Territory which has never been surveyed and into which, so far as known, none has ventured. Mr. Thurston and Mr. Harris will probably accompany me into the wilds of Puna as the Mahogany Company has applied for the right to cut oil on certain Government land there. My decision will be formed from the commercial or business aspect, as there is no water supply in Puna to be destroyed by a cutting down of trees, and water must always be the first consideration. Today I have been busy attending to several local matters near Hilo."
