LINK SAYS IT'S A GO

DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATE FOR DELEGATE AND HOW HE WORKED ON MAUI.
Lincoln L. McCandless returned from Maui this morning poorer in pocket but far richer in confidence that he will be able to succeed Prince Cupid as Delegate to Congress. He talked to large and enthusiastic audiences and believes that he converted many of the Hawaiians on Maui to become Democratic voters if not to being believers in the principles which he represents.
One of the other passengers who came down from Maui and attended several of Link's meetings, does not agree with him in the number of voters whose views he changed. He says that Link would deliver a long lecture on the land question, telling of how he, as a poor man, was going to help out the poor Hawaiian and see that he got all the land he wanted for nothing. This would work up his audience to high pitch of interest. When he stopped, however, some good Republican would pass through the crowd dropping a few hints and the natives would be heard to say, "Cha, I think he no good. He say he poor man. How he ride all time in automobile cost \$20 every day." Then everyone would laugh and proceed to drink a little at Link's expense.
It is said that Link was very generous with his production of good things and that the Hawaiians and other voters rarely went thirsty at his meetings. He made himself popular with the National Guardsmen at Wailuku through the presentation of a barrel of beer for their use.

A HARD TIME ON HALEAKALA

L. L. Harding and Jeremiah W. Doyle, of the Internal Revenue department, returned this morning from a month's business trip on Maui. They had an experience while visiting the crater of Haleakala which neither wishes to repeat. They picked up a native guide, who was told to get horses and provisions for the trip and said that everything had been prepared when they left Kipahulu at 6 o'clock Saturday morning. After they had gone some distance Doyle wanted some water and found that his guide had forgotten to bring any, but said that they could get plenty when they reached the crater.
Camp was made at 9 o'clock in the evening and the guide went to find the water, coming back to say that there was none. It was then discovered that the horses had not been fed or watered before the start was made and the poor animals were in a very bad way. As the result of the laxity of the guide, Harding and Doyle went without a drop of water till 2 p. m. on Sunday, while the animals had neither food nor water and were completely exhausted when they reached their destination on the other side of the mountain.
Harding states that the scenery on this trip, and also on a trip that the two made along the Keanae ditch trail, was the finest that he ever saw. The latter in particular impressed him, though the sunrise at Haleakala was one of the most wonderful of sights.

DECISION ENLIVENS THE CAMPAIGN

There has been some talk of withdrawals but none of the candidates are ready to stand for it. So far they all declare that they will go into the convention and "scrap" to a finish.
