CAPTAIN CARTER MUST PAY FINE

JUSTICE WILDER THE AUTHOR OF SUPREME COURT DECISION HOLDING THE HONOLULU DISTRICT COURT HAD JURISDICTION—PENALTY OF \$25 AGAINST LATE CAPTAIN OF NAVY YARD FOR ASSAULTING REPORTER MOORE STANDS.

Lieut. Comdr. J. F. Carter, formerly captain of the yard at the local naval station, must pay the \$25 fine which he was assessed by Judge Andrade, after being convicted of assaulting Reporter Moore, of the Bulletin. A decision holding that the Territorial courts have jurisdiction on naval reserves was handed down this morning, the opinion being written by Justice Arthur Wilder.

It was argued in the brief submitted by Attorney Prosser, who represented Carter, that the Territory of Hawaii is practically a state, within the meaning of the constitution for the reason of the Organic Act having constituted a separate Federal Court here and on account of the broad scope of power given the Governor. It was also held that there is nothing in the law on assault and battery which is inconsistent with the Constitution or Organic Act and that the control of the Territory over land taken for naval purposes has never been taken away by Act of Legislature or of Congress; "therefore it follows that the district court has jurisdiction and the judgment is affirmed." W. L. Whitney and F. W. Milverton appeared for the Territory in the case.

FORAKER EXPOSE AND OTHER SCANDALS

a character. It is equally surprising that Mr. Archbold, in directing the efforts of his paid servants in Congress, should have written so plainly to the public men in his employ. But as far as establishing Foraker's connection with the Standard Oil Company is concerned, no one was startled, except Mr. Foraker, and his friend Archbold.

What is true of Foraker is also true of Joe Sibley, former Congressman from Pennsylvania. During his service in the House of Representatives, Joe Sibley was a "jolly good fellow." Indeed he was the jolliest of the jolly; the best entertainer in the whole Congress, and personally as popular as any man under the Capitol's dome. He was an extravagant spender, and large oil operator who had sold out to the Standard Oil Company, and he was in Congress to "look after" the interests of that corporation and the interests of the Coal Trust.

Joe Sibley was an intimate friend of Speaker Cannon. They were the "Two Joes" and a couple of merry ways they were when together. They dined together, they played poker together, and they jibed together at odd times. What influence, if any, Joe Sibley had over Joe Cannon, can not be set down as fact, but the intimate relationship that existed between them will no doubt react against the Speaker in his campaign for re-election this fall, and the Speaker's record on trust legislation will be gone over with a fine-tooth comb to determine whether or not he fell under the persuasive influence of genial Joe Sibley, the messenger-boy and go-between of the Standard Oil Company.

If Joe Sibley had not occupied a seat in the House of Representatives, he would have been written down the most successful lobbyist in Washington. As a legislator he amounted to little so far as his district was concerned, but when it came to influencing votes on measures affecting his friend Archbold and the Standard Oil Company, he stood A. No. 1. He operated just like a lobbyist; he wine and dined members of both branches of Congress; he gave house parties and week-end parties for those needing special attention, and it was shown by Mr. Hearst that he even negotiated loans for those who were hard up, and were willing to sell out to the Standard Oil Company. Mr. Sibley was suspected of all else but the negotiation of loans; in that particular alone did Mr. Hearst throw new light on "Jovial Joe."

The one man that Hearst has helped is Senator Tillman of South Carolina. In all the years that Tillman has been exploding, condemning the corporations and President Roosevelt with equal vigor and roughness, his integrity has never been brought into question. Mr. Hearst has shown that the corporations wanted to defeat Tillman, and used his late colleague, McLaurin, as their instrument in eliminating "Pitchfork Ben." The Standard Oil Company evidently knew they could never make use of Tillman, and were therefore willing to spend good hard cash, and lots of it, to defeat him and elect a weaker and less honest man in his place. The very fact that Tillman incurred the enmity of the Standard Oil Company is evidence enough to show that he could not be bribed, for no corporation spent money more lavishly than this, and if Tillman was beyond the reach of the Standard Oil, he was beyond the reach of all other corporations.

That Senator McLaurin was a servant of the Standard Oil Company was not suspected in the days he was a member of the Senate. Gently retiring, quiet, yet scholarly, McLaurin was regarded highly in the Senate, and was deeply sympathized with when personally and viciously attacked upon the floor of the Senate by Mr. Tillman. Perhaps Mr. Tillman knew more of McLaurin than he ever told; perhaps he knew of McLaurin's attempt to bleed the Standard Oil in order to defeat his colleague. If he knew those things, his attack was the more justified than seemed probable at the time.

Where Hearst will strike next; whose record will be laid bare, no one

can tell but Hearst, and perhaps even he, at this time, can not foretell and he will have to say before the campaign closes. By the lavish use of money he has evidently gained access to the most confidential archives of the Standard Oil Company, or to the "sacred" correspondence of various public men. And not until the campaign closes will Senators and Representatives, having correspondence with Mr. Archbold, sleep soundly at night. If Hearst could get Foraker's correspondence, he may get Aldrich's; he may get Kean's; he may get Depey's; he may get Cannon's. If Foraker was fool enough to write and to receive damaging letters, why not Aldrich; why not Cannon; why not any of the others reasonably suspected of being on a level with Foraker? Who can tell where the "infant terrible" will stop?
