# PEACEFUL TURN TO SITUATION

British and Russian Ministers After Conference Give Out Hopeful Statement.

## DELEGATION REACHES JAPAN.

Cholera in Manila Decreasing—General Stewart Retired—Taft Going South.

LONDON, October 12.—The situation in the Balkans is quieter, the warring factions there awaiting the results of the conference held on Saturday between Iswolsky, the Russian Foreign Minister, and Sir Edward Grey, the British Foreign Secretary.

LONDON, October 12.—The British Atlantic fleet is preparing to sail from Gibraltar, where it has assembled. It is believed that the vessels will clear for Malta.

LONDON, October 12.—It is stated here that the Serbian Ministry is in imminent danger of dissolution as a result of the demands of the people of Belgrade for the resignation of the Ministers unless war with Austria is declared.

There has been a run on the banks in Belgrade as a result of the disturbances.

BELGRADE, October 11.—An extraordinary session of the Serbian Assembly has been opened amid great excitement. Last night two Austrian flags were burned in the great square before the house of Parliament. The people are aroused and demand war.

CANEA, Island of Crete, October 12. The Cretan Assembly will be opened today in the name of King George of Greece.

LONDON, October 11.—The British government is opposed to the aspirations of Crete for union with Greece.

CONSTANTINOPLE, October 11.—Bulgarian and Austrian products have been boycotted.

## THE CHOLERA RECORDS.

MANILA, October 12.—Five cases of cholera were reported on Saturday and three new cases on Sunday. Domiciliary visits through the infected districts will be continued for another two weeks.

ST. PETERSBURG, October 12.—Seventy-two cases of cholera and thirty-seven deaths from the disease are the figures given out by the city health authorities for yesterday.

## WELCOME TO YOKOHAMA.

YOKOHAMA, October 12.—The representative business men of the Pacific Coast, sent here as delegates from the various commercial bodies of the Coast States, arrived on the Tenyo Maru yesterday, and were enthusiastically received.

Great preparations are being made here for the arrival of the American Atlantic fleet.

## BALLOON BURSTS.

BERLIN, October 12.—The American balloon entered for the race here yesterday burst when four thousand feet in the air and fell. Two of the occupants of the car were slightly injured.

## SPORTING ITEMS.

CHICAGO, October 12.—In the second game of the series for the championship of the world, the Chicago baseball team yesterday made it two straight from Detroit, beating the American League champions by 6 to 1.

LONDON, October 11.—In the 26-mile running race there were 89 starters. H. S. Iret, a Frenchman, won. His time was two hours thirty-seven minutes twenty-three seconds.

## STEWART OUT OF ARMY.

WASHINGTON, October 11.—Colonel Stewart, U. S. A., who was banished to Fort Grant, Arizona Territory, by order of the President, has been retired from the army.

## PERISHED IN A WRECK.

NEWPORT, Rhode Island, October 11.—Six perished in the wreck of the Sirocco in the West Indies.

## FOUGHT OVER NEGRO BRUTE.

SPARTANBURG, Georgia, October 11.—Last night a mob fought the militia for possession of a negro ravisher. Four were wounded.

## TAFT TO GO SOUTH.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, October 11.—Mr. Taft will make a political tour of the South.

# DEMOCRATIC RALLY AT AALA PARK

There was a good attendance at the Democratic rally at Aala Park on Saturday evening, which lasted from 7:30 till after midnight. Edward Ingham, candidate for Supervisor, called the meeting to order and it was opened with prayer by Rev. Kulkahl.

Mr. Ingham made an opening address in which he predicted success for the Democratic ticket, implying as he represented a rebuke to the Republicans for their administration of Territorial affairs since annexation. He offered a justification for the acceptance of L. L. McCandless as head of the Democratic ticket, saying that although the candidate for Delegate had changed his politics he had not changed his principles. At the conclusion of his speech he introduced Senator C. J. McCarthy as chairman of the evening.

Senator McCarthy said he would present the various speakers, who would discuss issues and avoid personalities. Their candidates were all there facing the people, none of them hiding behind the building.

H. T. Moore, E. M. Watson, L. L. McCandless and Joseph J. Fern made the principal speeches. Judges Edings and Quarles pleaded lack of time to say all they wished and promised to address the voters at length another time.

Other speakers were Charles Girdler, W. A. Hall, D. Kaeka, D. Kahana-moku, Ed. Hanapi, Apua Kehau, Dan Kamahu, L. Keawepoole, E. Like, H. N. Crabbe, A. V. Peters, W. H. McClellan, Joseph Kuhea, M. A. Silva, R. H. Trent, W. P. Jarrett, Charles Rose, J. C. Anderson, George K. Low, Sam Kaloa, E. K. Rathburn and Frank Harvey.

Mr. Jarrett was well received and spoke in both English and Hawaiian.

Mr. Anderson used the English, Hawaiian and Chinese languages, and Mr. Low the English, Hawaiian and Spanish-Portuguese.

Mr. Moore announced a fiscal policy for the liquidation of the Territorial debt, denouncing the Republicans for their inadequate provision in that regard.

Mr. Watson informed the people that if the Government did not give them land the Japanese would be the voters twenty years hence. He praised the Democratic ticket as one that caused no shame to the party on account of any of the candidates. Referring to the Republican boasts of having brought about county government and the starting of the College of Agriculture, he claimed for the former a share of credit as due the Democrats and said the college would prove a gold brick unless the people had land to cultivate. The Democratic pledges of amendment of the land laws and to provide for the redemption of lands sold under foreclosure and under execution for taxes were urged as reasons for electing the Democratic ticket. It was the Democrats, the speaker claimed, who had driven booze, beer and buncombe out of politics, and put a stop to the chain of ballots system.

Mr. McCandless, in his Hawaiian remarks, urged the natives to vote for his land policy so as to prevent American settlers from coming in here and swamping the Hawaiian vote. In English he argued that the United States had given the Philippines a land law which was better than the land law of Hawaii. It was not his policy, however, to introduce the American land law as it stood but only in its principle.

Mr. Fern promised if elected Mayor to administer municipal affairs in a clean and honest manner. He did not consider his inferior knowledge of English a bar to his successful administration, feeling that a man could do a thing in Hawaiian just as well as he could in English.
