

CIVICS MEMBERS ARE IN REVOLT

CHALLENGE TO THE "CIVICS"

J. P. COOKE, A MEMBER ASKS THE DIRECTORS TO REPRESENT THE MEMBERS IN THEIR POLITICAL ACTION—MEETING IF HELD MIGHT RESULT IN DIRECTORS BEING COMPLETELY TURNED DOWN.

"I challenge the directors of the Civic Federation to produce a list of the members and to obtain from the members authority for what they have done," said J. P. Cooke this morning. "I am a member of the federation, but am going to resign. I have met other members who do not approve what has been done and who had no say in it. "I do not believe that the directors dare publish a list of the members, or try to get the approval of the members. I do not think over 25 members would endorse what the directors have done. For three years I have been a member, but about all the membership has consisted of has been paying in a dollar a year. There are no meetings to speak of, and all we members hear from the federation is from time to time announcements of what the directors have done. "In every corporation or society I know of but this one, the actions or officers or directors are subject to the approval of the members, and all so-

cities, even secret lodges, usually allow the names of their members to become known. The concealment of the list of the Civic Federation's members is an unheard-of thing. "There can be only one reason for refusal to give out the list of members. It is that the directors fear that the press would quickly discover that the members do not endorse what the directors have done." According to reports today, the Civic Federation's political announcement is the work of only a small proportion even of the fifteen directors of the federation. All the work of considering candidates was secret, was left to a small company, and members were not consulted. Other members are protesting against the action taken, and if a meeting of members were called to ratify the announcement of policy made by the Fed's directors, it would result, say these members, in the directors being turned down by a big vote.

BODE ASSAULT CASE FALLS DOWN

GRAND JURY SEES NOTHING IN THE SENSATIONAL ASSAULT CASE AND WILL TURN DOWN THE POLICE COURT CHARGE AGAINST JAPANESE SERVANT—A MYSTERY THAT WILL PROBABLY NEVER BE CLEARED UP.

That there will be no indictment brought in against Huyashi, the Japanese accused of assault on Organist Bode of the St. Andrew's Cathedral, is certain. The case was taken up before the Grand Jury this morning and from all that can be learned not only was the testimony found to be insufficient to convict before any court, but the story which has been told and published seems altogether too improbable on its face to be given much credence. Mrs. Bode and Miss Griffiths were both witnesses before the Grand Jury this morning, and told the same general story which they related to Judge Andrade, and on the strength of which, the latter held Huyashi for the inquisitorial body. How he could have been held on the grounds of probable cause is something which is puzzling. One of the strange things in the case, which the story of being hit

while asleep does not justify, is the second blow which was struck on the back of the head. The doctors who have been in the case state, it is understood, that after the first blow had been struck, if Bode had been asleep, he would have had to turn completely over and be lying on his face, to have received the second. As Bode states that he knows nothing of the matter and was completely unconscious from the time he was hit, this theory will not work out very well. Had the two blows been struck by a man anxious to commit the crime, and then escape, there would have been no time to turn over, even if the first had not caused Bode to become unconscious. MIDWAY ISLAND IS GROWING BIGGER

WAVES PILING UP SAND AND NO SAND-STORM IN EIGHTEEN MONTHS—SMART ROUND TRIP OF CABLE COMPANY'S FLAURENCE WARD—OPERATOR COX ISSUING A NEWSPAPER ON LONELY ISLE—RAPID TRANSIT FOR PHOTOGRAPHY.

A quick round trip of twenty-six days, eight days down and twelve up, is the showing of the Commercial Pacific Cable Company's steam auxiliary schooner Florence Ward, Captain Piltz, which early this morning returned from Midway.

Remarkable weather was experienced both going and returning, in that there was at no time anything but the pleasantest winds and pleasurable conditions. Not a sail was sighted either way.

Returning in the Ward was Cable Operator C. E. Beall and two Chinese servants.

Cable Operator Cox, on Midway, may return to Honolulu when the Florence Ward comes home on the next trip.

Cox is the life of the island, issuing a newspaper, hand-written, called THE MIDWAY GOONIE. It is full of interesting material, dealing entertainingly

with the political, social, financial and athletic conditions on Midway. Mr. Cox is also a promoter and erected an electric railway, that is he rigged up an old car and trolley wire to have the appearance of a real trolley-car and then photographed the outfit. After the picture was taken, so as to have proof that Midway really had a trolley system, the aforesaid system, known as the M. R. T., Midway Rapid Transit, was demolished, the operators going on strike.

Midway is growing bigger every day, more sand piling up through wave action and none being blown away. There has not been a sand-storm on Midway for eighteen months.

Everybody is well on Midway and the Minister of the Interior Cox sends aloha to his many Honolulu friends.

Captain Piltz brought back the Ward as spick and span as when she went out.

HUNDRED PACKAGES FOR FORTIFICATION

WIRELESS FROM S. S. LURLINE TELLS OF FEDERAL FREIGHT AND GENERAL CARGO—THIRTY-ONE PASSENGERS—THE MAIL AMOUNTS TO 124 SACKS—DOCKS AT NOON TOMORROW FROM SAN FRANCISCO—CONVENIENCE BECOMING NECESSITY.

Daily the convenience of the wireless is more clearly demonstrated and, in the opinion of local shipping men, but a few months will pass before that convenience will be looked up as an absolute necessity and steamships passing this way will all be equipped with wireless apparatus. There is no longer any excuse for the steamship companies to hold back, for Kahuku, the fruit of Expert Isbell's genius, is talking over two thousand miles and has received 2,400 miles, from Sitka, and nightly receives messages from coast stations from Alaska to Point Loma.

Honolulu is today, while the Matson Navigation S. S. Lurline is still hundreds of miles out, informed of the time of the vessel's arrival, her principal cargo and the number of passengers she is carrying in her cabin.

Time and money and labor are saved by the message sparked to Kahuku from the Lurline and received at 9:20 o'clock this morning.

The Federal engineers are aware of the fact that a hundred heavy packages of fortification material are in the Matson boat's hold; the consignee

is informed that twenty-seven head of cattle are in the Lurline's deck; the agents, Castle & Cooke are intelligently to the effect that the vessel has in all two thousand tons of cargo; the post office is made aware of 124 sacks of mail coming from San Francisco; hotels and hacks may make deductions from the information that there are thirty-one passengers in the cabin, and business men expecting hay, fertilizer and barley, are assured that their freight is aboard. And so are drays, stevedores, consignees, postal clerks, Federal authorities, cattlemen and others, directly or indirectly, acquainted with conditions which they are the better prepared to meet because of the wireless news.
