

ITALIAN-PRINCE GETS AMERICAN BRIDE AFTER LONG PILIKIA

ROME, October 20.—All doubts regarding the Elkins-Abruzzi marriage are now set at rest. The correspondent has the highest authority for the following statements, which the royal family desires to have published in the United States: The King officially has made known his consent to the marriage in order to prevent opposition from other members of the family; the Duke of Abruzzi's stepmother, the Duchess of Aosta, has formally announced to the Mayor of Asti that the marriage is imminent; the Duke himself. It was decided that the marriage where he expects the marriage will be officially announced at once.

Miss Elkins will enjoy full royal honors with the rank of a Princess of the blood, and any disposition on the part of members of the court circle to receive the American Duchess coolly will be frowned on by the King himself. It was decided that the marriage should take place in Baltimore, Cardinal Gibbons to officiate.

King Victor Emmanuel's present to the bride, according to the source, will be a diamond tiara valued at \$100,000.

TURIN, October 19.—The Duke of the Abruzzi has suddenly disappeared from Turin and as search has failed to locate him the report has gained circulation that he has left for America, sailing under an assumed name.

ELKINS (W. Va.), October 20.—When the cabled dispatches from Turin and London in connection with the alleged engagement between Miss Elkins and the Duke of Abruzzi were brought to the attention of United States Senator Elkins by the Associated Press today, he said: "The information is news to my family and myself. We cannot say anything because we don't know anything about it."
