## MONUMENT FOR KAMEHAMEHA III

A matter which it seems should be taken up by the Promotion Committee, or possibly by the Legislature, is the marking in a proper manner of the birthplace of Kamehameha III, the greatest king that Hawaii ever had. It is located at Kealahou, Hawaii, and the very rock upon which his mother, Keopuanihi, sat when the future ruler of Hawaii was born is shown.

Another interesting relic of the great king is the holoa, or slide which he built at this place when a young man. In this most interesting of Hawaiian sports he was the most expert of all the youths of the section and the tales of his grace and handsome bearing are still to be heard from the oldest kamaainas.

That this spot should be marked and some fitting monument erected is the wish expressed by A. F. Judd, who has just returned from a visit to the section. He states that the owner of the property is willing to co-operate in the matter and, if a suitable sign is sent, will look after its erection.

## SPARK TO VOLCANO

Operator Branch at the Kahuku wireless station is in receipt of messages by wireless from Isbell, on the Island of Hawaii, arranging for periods during the day and night when Branch is to send test messages from Kahuku for Isbell to catch wherever he happens to be on the Big Island.

These tests, which began at 11 o'clock this morning, are for the purpose of ascertaining where to place the long distance station on Hawaii.

Isbell carries with him his receiver and a small field aerial, a wire arrangement that he can attach to a telephone pole, a smoke-stack or other convenient height. He goes to the volcano, for a visit, before he gives much attention to tests about Hilo, but for connections with Kahuku. From the crater edge he expects to receive messages from Branch at Kahuku.

## REMEDY DIFFICULT

Deputy Attorney W. L. Whitney is working hard on the act of the Legislature which it is proposed to pass by which the erection of tenement houses and camps in the resident district may be regulated. The drawing of a statute which will cover this completely, and still not interfere with any of the constitutional rights of a citizen who desires to erect such a building, is a difficult matter. When Mr. Whitney thinks he has the idea down just right it often happens that a further study of authorities will disclose some decision in a state of the Union by which the very paragraph which seemed perfected has been found to be bad law.

## COMPANY PAYS

If the grade of a street is changed the gas company, even if its pipes were laid before this occurred, must pay for the work of changing them itself, according to an opinion by Deputy Attorney General Whitney, rendered at the request of Superintendent of Public Works, Campbell. According to the statute the Superintendent of Public Works when gas mains are put in, has the supervision of the work done and if the street is not properly repaired shall make the repairs and charge the same to the gas company. The question of changing grades has not been decided before, however.

Like chaff before a winter wind would be the machinations of interested politicians to hold back reports against this army of newspaper men. Each of the big New York newspapers bulletined the reports on big screens specially constructed. The service was never so perfect in all the history of journalism.

## ATCHERLEY IN PRINT

Dr. John Atcherley, member of the Royal College of Surgeons and L. R. C. P., London, of this city, has just issued a broadside on "The Causation of Leprosy" in which he introduces the subject by saying that "in spite of every means and opportunity for the study of leprosy in these islands, which are unequalled, those who adopt the contagion theory have always been obliged to have recourse to some remote geographical spot to produce a supposedly authenticated case of undoubted contagion."

Among the statements made in Dr. Atcherley's circular the following are culled: "The only evidence of contagiousness is the presence of the bacillus leprae and it is a mere inference to conclude from this that the disease may be classed as contagious. "Segregation fails to segregate in view of the number who escape arrest and it fastens the disease in the locality where segregation is enforced; the enforcement of segregation infers contagion and no other way is looked for by which it may be spread, and food is no longer considered as a possible danger to be avoided. "There is very strong evidence in the effect of diet. Arrests of progress of the disease are often found to correspond to changes of residence and corresponding change of diet, thus a man afflicted with the disease as a fisherman will improve if he transfers to an inland ranch involving revolution in the nature of his diet. "The disease has never been successfully inoculated even in the Arning case; his associations were those of predisposition. The subject had relatives similarly afflicted; this is an argument that can be taken in two ways. "The belief that the disease is contagious is with many hereditary, which explains dread of infection."
