## FIRST ROUND IN ELECTION CONTEST

ROBERTSON AND DAVIS FOR LANE AND WATSON AND THAYER FOR FERN ARGUE ON DEMURRER BEFORE SUPREME COURT—DECISION IS SHORTLY EXPECTED—QUESTION OF WHAT CONSTITUTES A DISTRICT THE TURNING POINT.

The argument on the demurrer to the petition for a recount of the votes cast in the late election for mayor took place before the Supreme Court this morning and a decision may be expected in the near future. The entire matter rests on one paragraph in the paper filed, in which the question of what constitutes an "election district" is the point which the court is asked to decide.

In the laws upon elections there are four kinds of districts mentioned, senatorial, representative, county and election districts. Attorneys Watson and Thayer in their demurrer hold that the section providing for a contest, which states that a petition may be brought by "any thirty qualified voters of any election district," refers to section 105 of the Revised Statutes, which divides the island of Oahu into two "election districts." They then contend that since the petition does not show that the petitioners are thirty or more in number from either the Fourth or Fifth Districts is void and has no place in court. If this ground is accepted and the demurrer allowed, since it is too late to file a second petition there can be no con-

demurrer in the case of James Kulike et al versus Joseph J. Fern, made the following order: "It is ordered upon the court's motion that the plaintiff's affidavits be struck from the files together with the defendant's motion to strike them off and the plaintiff's joinder in demurrer and motion to set the case for hearing.

Attorneys Robertson and Davis, who argued for the petitioner, alleged that the election district referred to in the County Act comprises the entire island, and that it does not refer to the smaller divisions of the Territorial law. To divide up the county into two parts would be incorrect, for the county is not divided in any manner in the voting for mayor, as is the case with other officers.

Attorney Watson opened the argument for the petitioners and was followed by Judge George Davis, A. G. M. Robertson closed for the petitioners and W. W. Thayer for his side, though a few supplemental remarks were made by his colleague in answer to questions asked by Justice Wilder. Upon convening of the court this a. m. it made the following announcement: "A rule of court will be made that in election contests the court will set the case for hearing upon the defendant's filing his demurrer, plea or answer which he will be at liberty to do at any time before the return day; that no replication or joinder in demurrer will be filed; The court before hearing the de-
