WILL DR. ROLLER MAKE A FIGHTER

Is the world of pugilism to witness the coming of a new heavyweight champion almost unheralded and unknown?

If the aspirations of Dr. B. F. Roller of this city are fulfilled this is what will happen within the near future.

Roller, who arose like a comet in the wrestling arena, and whose shoulders were never pinned to the mat except by one man, Frank Gotch, present world's champion, believes he has the ability to gain the topmost rung in the ladder which marks the way to the heavyweight championship in the squared circle.

And if physique counts—well, it would be a hard job to find any human being more perfectly built.

There have been self-styled "phenoms" who have had the championship bee buzzing in their bonnets, and they have generally lasted just about long enough to receive one good punch.

Roller is different. When he became a wrestler even his friends were startled as he threw "Farmer" Burns, Westgaard, Donnellson and others, finally winding up by putting Fred Beal, the Wisconsin "demon," down for the fourth consecutive time. Then he lost to Gotch, the acknowledged peer of all wrestlers.

And all this meteoric career embraced less than twelve months.

When Bob Fitzsimmons was in Seattle recently he met Roller in a local club and put on the gloves with him for a few rounds.

"You can be the world's champion with training," was Fitzsimmons' comment.

And very shortly Roller will leave for New York City, where he

will go into training with Fitzsimmons.

"You can announce that as soon as I am properly trained," says Roller, "that I will issue a challenge to any man in the world for any amount of money and under any reasonable conditions."

Roller is one of the big, limber type, muscles like a greyhound; marvelous lung power, and his wrestling training has always included boxing, which gives him a splendid start as a professional pugilist.

If Roller should secure a ring argument here's the way he would stack up: Age 30 years; height, 6 feet; weight, 210 pounds; reach, 76 inches; biceps, 17½ inches; forearm, 14½ inches; chest, 47½ inches; waist, 36½ inches; thigh, 27½ inches; calf, 17½ inches; neck, 17½ inches; wrist, 8 inches.

SOUL LOVER READ OUT OF CHURCH

E. A. JOYCE IS DECLARED UNFIT FOR CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP BY CONGREGATION.

BERKELEY, January 4.—Anathema was pronounced against E. A. Joyce, a contractor, who left his wife and family some weeks ago to find his soul mate in Mrs. E. E. Curtis of Ocean View, by the congregation of the First Christian Church yesterday. Joyce was officially "read out" of the congregation, of which he had been one of the pillars.

This action was taken on the motion of H. P. McAneny, moderator of the board of deacons, president of the Berkeley Bible Seminary and an elder

of the church. Joyce was pronounced "unfit for Christian fellowship."

No mention was made in the tale of the sins of the absent contractor or his departure with Mrs. Curtis. His brethren confined themselves to condemning his action in deserting his wife and family, leaving them destitute. The Joyce home is at 2434 Milvia street, and Mrs. Joyce has been supporting herself since her husband's desertion by taking in boarders and by sewing, receiving help from her friends.

Joyce and Mrs. Curtis deserted their homes early last month. The flight of the couple followed a number of visits Joyce paid to Mrs. Curtis during her husband's absence, as a result of which a strange infatuation developed so strong as to cause Joyce to desert his family and Mrs. Curtis to forsake her husband. They obtained all available funds before leaving, and it is believed that they are in Seattle or Portland.
