THE LOG-BOOK

An arrival tomorrow morning will be the Claudine from her regular Maui and Hilo run.

The naval transport Buffalo will sail at 7 o'clock tomorrow morning for San Francisco.

An arrival on Friday will be the freighter Mexican, of the A.-H. line. She will take sugar here and then go to Maui and Hilo.

The monitor Wyoming, which has long been slated for Honolulu as station vessel, has had her name changed to the "Cheyenne."

Holiday flags were shown by the Marie Hackfeld and other vessels in port today in honor of the birth anniversary of Emperor William.

Spick and span as a new boat the naval transport Buffalo will sail at 7 o'clock tomorrow morning for San Francisco and Mare Island. No mail will be taken by her, as a regular steamer leaves here on Friday.

An arrival this morning was the oil steamer W. S. Porter from Gaviota. She began discharging at once and will be through during the afternoon. The Porter, with the ship Marion Chilcott in tow, will get away about tomorrow afternoon for the coast.

The French bark Ville de Mulhouse, Captain Bony, received orders yesterday afternoon to sail for Sydney. She is taking on fresh water, etc., today and will get away during the late afternoon. The Mulhouse is one of the vessels that came all the way up here from Hobart for orders.

A New York shipping authority says that the competition of French bounty-fed vessels is beginning to be felt at all Australian ports. About twenty French vessels, the report goes, are on their way to Adelaide alone to load wheat, and others are to follow. The French barks recently here were doubtless among this number.

It is reported from Seattle that the old missionary steam schooner Morning Star has been sold by James A. Moore to Greer, Courtney & Skene, and that she will be used in the freight traffic between Sound ports and Vancouver. The Morning Star, which is the last of a considerable list of vessels of the same name, plied between Honolulu and the Gilbert, Marshall and Caroline Islands prior to the taking over of the missionary work down there by the American Board.
