WHAT WE HEAR ON A COLD DAY.

**BITTEN BY A VICIOUS DOG**

The Hon. D. Paul R. Isenberg is a dog fancier, but he does not like all dogs. In fact he has a special grievance against one canine, of the female persuasion, having a home with a Japanese named Shiona near the corner of Beretania and Pensacola streets. While passing the place this morning the statesman and financier was attacked by the vicious little brute and severely bitten on the leg. This happened, too, on Emperor William's birthday, with the consular reception, with Mr. Isenberg an important as well as conspicuous figure to be present, only a few hours away.

Mr. Isenberg was mad. He said so at the police station, and he looked the part. Officer M. Suenaga was dispatched to the scene of the battle with instructions to bring in Mrs. Dog post haste. But the wily canine was old in such business, and as soon as she saw the badge of the officer she hoofed under the house, which stood only a few inches above the ground. Coaxing, threats, smoky language nor prods would stir her from her retreat. The officer made a complete failure of his job, and so reported to the deputy sheriff.

Angered at this situation, Deputy Sheriff Rose ordered out re-enforcements for a new attack. Humane Officer George Holt was detailed as a kind of major-general to capture Mrs. Dog. Under his command were Suenaga and two specials. The commander and his men resorted to every means known to the police to induce the lady dog to surrender, but she held her ground. Finally, despairing, the posse gave it up and arrested the supposed owner of the dog, Shiona. The man was locked up and will appear in court tomorrow.

Chung See, the woman arrested at Waikane for selling a strange liquor without license, was found guilty and sentenced to pay a fine of \$100. On the stand the woman, who claimed the alleged liquor was a medicine, described the compound as composed of gin, herbs, pigs' feet and tiger claws. This almost places her in the class with Wallach, of female rocks fame. The woman had been selling this "medicine" to Hawaiians and Chinese.

**AUTOS WILL SHOW BIG**

THE FLORAL PARADE WILL ALSO HAVE FRATERNAL SOCIETIES OUT IN FORCE.

J. M. Dowsett, chairman of the Automobile Committee of the Floral Parade, stated this morning that he is very much encouraged by the attitude of the automobile owners in the city with regard to entering their machines in the parade. "With scarcely an exception," said Senator Dowsett, "all the owners that I have seen have expressed willingness to decorate their cars, or to turn them over to the committee for use in the parade. Several stated that they would personally not be able to give the time to the work, or had other engagements for Washington's Birthday, but were very ready to offer the use of their machines to some competent person selected by us."

The Committee is hoping to have as a feature in the parade a large number of automobiles or floats decorated appropriately and entered by various civic organizations. A few such were in evidence last year, but an effort will be made this year to have practically all of the societies and clubs of the city in line. Among these organizations, Senator Dowsett suggests, should be the Chamber of Commerce, Merchants' Association, Masons, Elks, Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias, Yacht Club, Boat Clubs, Golf Clubs, Polo Clubs, and other athletic and social and fraternal societies. "My idea in this matter," said Chairman Dowsett, "is that each of these organizations can secure an automobile or float and decorate it appropriately, at very little expense to individual members, and at the same time produce a feature that will be one of the most effective parts of the parade. I have suggested the matter to members of several organizations, and from the manner in which it was received I am encouraged to believe that we can count on this as a feature."

This is on the line of the Oahu Railway and the ride to the place is along the sea coast for a part of the distance. **ADORNING CITY HALL**

Mayor J. J. Fern is about to inaugurate the adornment of the City and County offices by hanging portraits, enlarged photographs, in his outer office, where his secretary abides.

Today there are to be delivered, fresh from the photo factory, eight great pictures, framed to be hung on the walls of Secretary Rhodes' headquarters. These works of art are separate likenesses of the members of the preceding Board of Supervisors, of the County of Oahu, of which Board Fern was a member. The eighth portrait will be that of Clerk Kalaoukiani.

Other officers may follow the example set by the Mayor and adorn their walls with suitable pictures. At present the only other mural decorations are the two frames in the Assembly room, one frame containing pictures of the previous Board of Supervisors and another holding photos of the first Board of Supervisors of the County of Oahu.

There are many at present bleak walls where there is room for adornment and it has been suggested that among portraits which might appropriately find hangings are those of A. L. C. Atkinson who several years ago ushered in County Government in the Executive building, the christening of the gallant ship of local self government being consummated with the assistance of several cases of champagne, and a host of notables, Federal, Territorial and County, attending the baptism.

Then it is also suggested that Charlie Achi, the drafter of the Municipal Bill, should have his picture on the wall of the Mayor's private office.

"Achi's a good draftsman," said Fern this morning, but further he would not commit himself.

Charlie Achi is today vacating the second floor of the McIntyre building which is now affectionately referred to as "the City Hall." There is a note of pathos in the fact of the father of City and County government being evicted, as it were, from the precincts of the headquarters of the government he helped to shape, and poetic justice might at least leave a picture of his memory.

Physical improvements are going on apace in the City and County Chambers. A counter has been erected in the receiving room of the Attorney's department, behind which Detective Lake "keeps cases," writes up a daily log, examines witnesses and notes complaints. Engineer Gerv's hallway cubby-hole is reaching the vanishing stage. The District Magistrate's private chamber is about ready for occupancy and the room today being vacated by Charlie Achi is to be used as a storeroom for documents, books, and City and County archives generally. Prosecutor A. M. Brown has a room of his own.

Two more cases of diphtheria and one suspicious case were reported to the Board of Health today. They were in Gonsalves lane off Beretania street. For six months past the record is now 24 cases and one suspicious.

Two cases of scarlet fever were discovered on Punchbowl slopes today. In consequence 21 people, divided between Portuguese and Spanish, have been sent to the quarantine station.

Receipts of the Hawaiian Treasury for December were \$120,561.92, against \$84,355.76 for the corresponding month of 1907, a gain of \$36,206.16. Current account expenditures for the month were \$385,253.54. The current cash balance was \$304,131.82, being \$22,029.12 less than a year before. There was \$174,365.20 left in the loan fund. At the end of the year the Territory's bonded indebtedness was \$3,359,000, a reduction of \$43,000 for the year.
