

HAWAII TO HAVE TWO U. S. JUDGES

COASTWISE POST CARD VOTE NOW

PETITION AGAINST SUSPENSION CAUSES THE MERCHANTS' ASSOCIATION TO TAKE THE MATTER UP AGAIN—WILL HOLD A SPECIAL MEETING AND HAVE POSTAL CARD VOTE TAKEN ON PROPOSITION.

The Merchants' Association is going to have a postal card vote on the coastwise suspension proposition. A petition is being circulated opposing suspension, and by way of answer some members of the association circulated a call for a special meeting. As a result there will be a meeting on Thursday afternoon to call for a post card vote.

Davis moved and contended for her appointment, Robbins D. Anderson for Hawaiian Trust Co. opposing. The motion was denied.

SERVICE COMPANY

Articles of association of "Oahu Service Company, Limited," were filed in the office of the Treasurer of Hawaii today. It takes powers of conducting restaurants, laundries and general merchandise business in the Territory, also the usual property holding privileges.

Directors for the first year are Richard H. Trent, Robert Murphy, Lewis B. Reeves, Irwin H. Beadle and Thomas E. Robinson and the capital stock is \$500 in shares of \$100 each with privilege of extension to \$15,000. Stock actually subscribed is \$1500. Trent, Murphy and Reeves being down for \$500 each. Trent is president, Reeves secretary and Beadle treasurer of the corporation.

This is the company organized with the immediate object of catering to the necessities of the cavalry camp at Lilelehu. One of the incorporators spoke to a Star reporter the other day in warm appreciation of the courtesy shown to them by Colonel Schuyler in allotting favorable sites to them for their necessary buildings on the reservation.

TO PLACE ANDO IN BANKRUPTCY

Proceedings have been taken to place S. Ando of Hilo in involuntary bankruptcy. E. C. Peters having filed papers in the Federal Court for the petitioners, Hoffschlaeger Company, von Hamm Young Co. and I. Rubenstein. Although the aggregate of claims of the petitioners is but \$24.47, they allege as cause for putting Ando through liquidation in bankruptcy that he has committed an act of bankruptcy in making a general assignment to Y. Takakuwa and T. Odo.

Judge Dole having been communicated with at Hilo by wireless has signified his readiness to sign an order for the respondent to show cause why he should not be adjudicated a bankrupt. The order prepared is returnable on February 17.

LYMAN PASSES

President Griffiths of Oahu College, Punahou, this morning received a cablegram from Washington, D. C., announcing that Chandler B. Lyman of Hawaii had passed his West Point examination and had been ordered to report at West Point Military Academy on March 1.

Lyman is a graduate of Punahou, was catcher on the Punahou Athletic Club baseball team and is the son of R. A. Lyman of Hilo, Hawaii.

BILL FOR TWO FEDERAL JUDGES GOING THROUGH

WASHINGTON, D. C., February 2.—The Senate Judiciary Committee has favorably reported the bill for an additional Federal Judge for the district of Hawaii.

This report probably settles the fate of the bill. It has already passed the House of Representatives, and a favorable report from the Senate Judiciary committee practically insures its passage by the Senate, and as Roosevelt is in favor of it, it will probably become law within a few days, making it the duty of the president to appoint another United States Judge for this district, who shall have similar jurisdiction to Judge Dole.

There are a number of local candidates talked of for the position, though most of the active ones have kept dark. It is said that there is a move in favor of A. Lewis Jr., law partner of W. O. Smith, and that very influential endorsements of him are at hand.

Circuit Judge Robinson has been talked of as an aspirant, and it is understood that he would accept, but if political pull is to count for anything he is not in it for Secretary Metcalf, his friend in the Cabinet, has passed into retirement.

District Attorney Breckons has also been mentioned as a possible appointee.

Associate Justice Ballou, of the Supreme Court, is another man prominent as a member of the local bench who is talked of for the position. Others who have been mentioned are W. O. Smith, H. E. Cooper, Chief Justice Hartwell, Judge F. M. Hatch, W. R. Castle, Judge Perry, Henry Holmes, D. L. Withington, A. G. M. Robertson.

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
