

blessing by which we are permitted to see the beginning of this structure which we fondly trust is to outlast our lives and stand upon this sightly spot as a sign and promise of the prosperity of coming years.

"For this hour and all that it means to us we are devoutly thankful. We rejoice in the enterprise and courage which Thou hast put into the hearts of those who foresaw the need and projected the plan for this goodly structure. May their faith have its full realization and their enterprise a full measure of reward.

"It is by thy favor that this community enjoys such prosperity and promise as furnish a full warrant for this undertaking. We pray for our city. May it suffer no disaster from without or discord from within. May harmony and peace reign amid its citizens and prosperity in its places of business.

"We now invoke Thy blessing upon the service for which we have gathered: upon the work which shall follow until the temple stands complete, and upon each of our lives until we may have an entrance in the house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. WIRELESS MAY COMPETE WITH CABLE

WIRELESS TELEGRAPH COMPANY WILL SOON HOLD YEARLY MEETING—PROPOSITION OF TRANS-OCEAN MESSAGES TO COMPETE WITH CABLE—HUTCHINS IS SILENT AND COAST CONNECTIONS ARE SUPPOSED TO BE RESPONSIBLE—BALCH'S POSITION.

Within a few days the annual meeting of the Wireless Telegraph Company is to be held in this city. President Clinton J. Hutchins will preside and a most interesting report will be made by Manager J. A. Balch, together with certain important recommendations left here by Wireless Expert A. A. Isbell before he went to Massachusetts for a vacation—to Boston for a rest.

The annual meeting of the local wireless will mark the opening of a new era in local wireless, for immediately following the yearly meeting it is expected that plans will be definitely published outlining a scheme of inter-coast communication to compete with the trans-Pacific cable at considerably reduced rates.

The Kahuku long-distance station has shown such unexpected success that the management believes it is warranted in going ahead with some revolutionary ideas in the matter of trans-ocean intelligence.

Much depends, however, on the settlement of the situation bearing on the proposed amalgamation of wireless interests with the affairs of the automatic telephone scheme in which latter enterprise Hutchins is the moving spirit. This deal is at a standstill just now, as previously announced, for an option on Balch's stock fell through and the probability of a new deal is being talked of.

Manager Balch is now going ahead with necessary improvements to the wireless system, but it is said that as far as new ventures are concerned he is not likely to make any move until he finds where he is to stand in regard to the affairs of the company. If the wireless is to remain a wireless affair alone he is likely to remain manager, or Isbell may come here to manage, but if the automatic consolidation is consummated Balch is likely to seek pastures new. Hutchins has nothing to say at present and it is believed that he is awaiting advices from the coast.
