WEEKLY WEATHER BULLETIN

FOR THE WEEK ENDED FEBRUARY 13, 1909.
Honolulu, February 15, 1909.

GENERAL SUMMARY.

Rains during the week, and rather large in amounts, broke or greatly ameliorated the drought conditions which have obtained for such a long period of time in the Kau and portions of the Puna districts of Hawaii, and the central and southern districts of Maui; and for a shorter period in the Kona of Hawaii. In the Kau district of Hawaii the amounts ranged from 3.26 to 3.30 inches, and in the Kona from 1.79 to 2.93 inches; and in the central and southern districts of Maui from 0.75 inch to 1.96 inches.

Thunderstorms were reported from practically all of Hawaii, and a good part of Maui on the evening of the 6th, and as a rule they were attended with heavy rains. Haiku, Maui, reports a thunderstorm during the night of the 7th, attended with a heavy fall of snow on Mt. Haleakala, Maui. Mapulehu Ranch, Molokai, reports snow as visible on the morning of the 7th on Mt. Haleakala, Maui, and Mt. Mauna Loa, Hawaii.

The rainfall was above the average for the week of ten or more years at all stations on Hawaii but one; in the Wailuku district of Maui, and the Koolau and Kona districts of Kauai; and below the average in the Waimea district of Kauai; the Hamakualoa and Lahaina districts of Maui, and in all districts of Oahu, excepting the Waianae.

The excesses, in inches, in the several districts were: Hawaii—Kohala 0.01 to 0.24, Hamakua 0.42, excepting —0.27 at Paauhau; central and southern Hilo 2.18 to 2.88, Kau 1.94 to 2.04, and Kona 1.85; Maui—Wailuku 1.50; Oahu—Waianae 0.50; and Kauai—Koolau 0.33, and Kona 0.32. The deficiencies were: Oahu—Koolauloa 0.86, Koolaupoko 0.26 to 0.37, and Honolulu 0.58 to 0.77; Maui—Hamakualoa and Lahaina 0.16 to 0.24; and Kauai—Waimea 0.09.

The amounts of rainfall, in inches, in the districts not quoted herein before were: Hawaii—Kohala and Hamakua 1.04 to 1.39, and southern and central Hilo 4.95 to 5.65; Maui—Koolau 3.30 to 5.54; Hamakualoa, 1.38, and Hana 2.75; Oahu—Koolauloa 0.74, Koolaupoko, 1.47 to 1.81, Honolulu 0.98 to 1.08, Ewa 0.91 to 1.60, and Waianae 1.98; Kauai—Kona and Koolau 1.82 to 2.91, Puna 0.98 to 1.02, and Waimea 0.00 to 0.85; and Molokai 1.51 to 1.68.

The mean temperatures were as a rule considerably higher than those of the preceding week on Hawaii; in north-central Maui, and in the northern portion of the Koolaupoko district of Oahu; and generally considerably lower on the leeward side of Oahu, in central Molokai, and in the Puna district of Kauai.

At the local office of the U. S. Weather Bureau in Honolulu clear and partly cloudy weather generally obtained, with measurable rainfall on three. Lates attending light kona storms, and amounting to 0.98 inch, 0.58 inch below the normal and .08 less than during the preceding week. The maximum temperature was 75 deg., minimum 56 deg., and mean 67.5 deg., 3.1 deg. below the normal, and 1.7 deg. lower than last week's. The mean daily relative humidity ranged from 68 to 82 per cent, and for the week was 76.4 per cent. Southeast to southwest winds prevailed on each day, excepting the last one, and for the week the prevailing direction was southwest, with an average hourly velocity of 7.1 miles. The mean daily barometer varied from 29.86 to 30.03 inches, and for the week was 29.97, normal.

POPULAR DEMONSTRATION.

THE HOUSE

TENTH DAY.
Afternoon Session.

Conservation addresses before the Joint Legislature yesterday afternoon made it nearly four o'clock before the House took up afternoon work.

There came from the Senate, the House resolution branding the advocacy of government by commission as harmful and against the good of the best interests here, the Senate having amended to eliminate the section which provided that Congress be sent copies of the resolution. Sheldon objected, but Douthitt favored it as a good change, declaring emphatically that to burden Congress with any such resolution would but draw unfavorable attention to the suggestion that there was any real move here toward desiring government by commission. The matter, in Correa's motion, was deferred until today.

Kalelopu entered a bill to authorize the deposit of Territorial moneys in local banks.

Castro presented the following bills: An Act relating to stamp duties.

An act relating to the circulation of commercial paper, providing that any person or corporation, or officers thereof, or any company of persons, who shall issue any note, bill, order, check or certificate of deposit in any sum of money with the intent that the same shall be circulated as currency, and be guilty of a misdemeanor, and for every offense shall be punished by a fine of fifty dollars, or be imprisoned not to exceed one month; provided that nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the issuing of clearing-house certificates by a duly-organized clearing house.

An act relating to licenses, providing that the annual fee for a license to peddle merchandise shall be \$60; that no license shall be required of persons selling and peddling fish, fresh fruit or vegetables. A license to peddle merchandise shall authorize the holder to peddle throughout the Territory.

An act to amend Section 3151 of the Revised Laws, defining what a procurer and a pimp are and setting a fine of from \$100 to \$500 and imprisonment at hard labor not less than two or more than five years.

Afonso enter a bill declaring and designating a certain tract of land at Hilo, Hawaii, as a public park; All that certain tract of land at the corner of Pitman and Ponahawai streets, Hilo, Hawaii, more fully described as follows, to wit: beginning at the new north corner of Pitman and Ponahawai streets, the co-ordinates of said corner referred to government survey trig. station "Halal" being 1491.92 feet north and 3582.05 feet east, as shown on government survey registered map No. 1561, and running by true azimuths: representatives Payne and Grosvenor, but differs from these in that it does not prescribe a ten-year contractual obligation on the part of the government for a subsidy or a bounty.

The bill provides that compensation at the rate of \$1 per hundred gross tons for each one hundred miles shall be paid as compensation on each entry of a vessel of American register, the entire not to exceed sixteen to twelve consecutive months.

Punohu was fined \$15 in police court this morning for badly trouncing one J. Kanan. The case of August Hering charged with assaulting a Chinaman with a pistol, is being heard by Judge Andrade this afternoon.

TOURISTS FOR THE VOLCANO

The Mauna Kea, sailing at noon today for Maui and Hawaii ports, took one of the largest lists for the volcano carried by any steamer in a very long time. Counting those who will make short stops at other ports en route, the volcano list numbered forty-eight persons. On account of the deluge of Kilauea tourists, D. Lycurgus, who has been in town, also took his departure by the Mauna Kea and will be "special conductor" of the visitors.

The departure of the Mauna Kea was the liveliest event on the waterfront this morning. Besides the volcano passengers there were over sixty for way ports, taxing the Mauna Kea's cabin accommodations almost to the limit. Following were the departures:
