ENGINES OF TENYO BARK

Wind and the outward tide came near making trouble for the big Japanese liner Tenyo Maru as she was leaving port this morning. She pulled away from the Hackfeld wharf all right, made the turn opposite Brewer's wharf so as to head outward and then started for the channel. Then the trouble began. The turbine engines with which she is equipped refused to steer in such close quarters. Wind and tide then gradually veered the big ship off until she was headed straight for the lighthouse. When directly off the foot of Fort street she signalled for a tug and came to a full stop. The Intrepid responded promptly, and by steadying ahead and then slowly turning the bow toward the channel, she gave the big steamer a straight head on the open sea. Once in the channel and running straight ahead the vessel was alright.

The turbine engines are the best ever for running straight ahead or even wide turns; but when it comes to the spinning wheel act they are not in with the old style machinery. As the Tenyo was drawing twenty-nine feet forward, and is about 600 feet in length, she was no toy to handle.

Tacoma, March 5—S. S. Texan sailed yesterday for Honolulu.

BUFFALO, February 28.—Albert Shrub, the English long-distance runner, beat Dorando Pietro, the Italian champion, in a fifteen-mile race in the Seventy-fourth Regiment armory tonight. The Englishman won by two and a half laps, the track being nine laps to the mile. At the last mile Shrub had a lead of three laps, but Dorando cut it down by a terrific sprint. The time was 1:24:06 4-5.

An immense crowd saw the race. Shrub shot into the lead at the start and at the end of the first mile had a lead of half a lap. Three laps before the second mile Shrub had a lead of a lap, which he held for two miles. At five miles and eight laps Shrub started out again, and at the sixth mile had gained another lap. At the ninth mile Shrub was disappointed, but the fear at ten miles and eight laps Shrub was three laps ahead. Dorando sprinted a number of times and twice took the lead amid cheers. In the last mile the Italian, by a wonderful sprint, gained a half lap, but lost the race.

Tom Longboat was to have run against Longboat, but failed to appear. Shrub was disappointed, but the fear that he would not get a contest of any kind was dissipated when Pietro ar- rived ready for a race and glad to get on with Shrub under any conditions. Shrub ruled a 7 to 10 favorite.
