MRS. LORD
HEDGED

TREASURY DECLINED TO REMIT
HER \$200 FINE FOR TRAVELING
IN JAPANESE STEAMSHIP.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 24.—Mrs.
E. J. Lord, of Honolulu, who came
here on the Japanese liner Tenyo Maru
and professed her readiness to pay the
\$200 forfeit for traveling coastwise on
a foreign ship, so anxious was she to
attend the inauguration of President
Taft, has hedged.

She has asked the Treasury author-
ities to remit the fine for the reason
that the doctor ordered her to come on
the Tenyo Maru instead of the Ameri-
can steamer Alameda, because the for-
mer was the larger boat and she was
in ill health.

Collector Stratton was stone-hearted
and recommended that the fine be en-
forced, but Mrs. Lord did the best she
could with the heads of the department
to have his recommendation ignored.

With what little success her efforts
met is shown by the following letter
received from Assistant Secretary
William R. Wheeler of the Department
of Commerce and Labor, by Collector
Stratton's office yesterday:

"The department has received your
letter of the 9th instant, transmitting
the application of Mrs. E. J. Lord for
relief from the penalty of \$200 incurred
in the case of the Japanese steamer
Tenyo Maru for violation of section 2
of the act of February 17, 1898, in that
she was carried as a passenger on the
said vessel from Honolulu. The appli-
cant submits an affidavit to the effect
that being in poor health her physician
advised her to take passage on the
Tenyo Maru because of its being a
larger vessel than the American steam-
ship Alameda, which left Honolulu
about the same time. It appears that
the applicant originally took passage
on the Alameda, due to arrive at your
port on February 16th, the purpose of
her trip being to attend the inaugura-
tion in Washington on March 4th. Both
the Alameda and the Tenyo Maru en-
tered your port on the 16th ult. You
recommend that the fine be not re-
mitted. In the opinion of the depart-
ment the facts submitted do not war-
rant its intervention in this case."

DOOM FOR
PRIMARY LAW

RUMOR SAYS THAT REPUBLICAN
PARTY LEADERS WILL KILL
ACT CALLED FOR IN PLATFORM.

The primary law, to which the Re-
publican party is pledged in its plat-
form comes up in the Senate next Wed-
nesday, and if the rumors heard in
corridors are true it has about as much
chance of passage as the proverbial
snowball has of existence. It is even
stated that should it pass, there will
be loopholes in it which will be wide
enough to drive a wagon through and
that it will never be able to stand the
scrutiny of the Supreme Court if test-
ed before that body.

It was referred to the Committee on
elections and discussed by that body
freely, without any conclusion being
arrived at. Then it was turned over
to the Senate committee of the whole.
More discussion took place and still
nothing was done. Yesterday
afternoon it came up once more and
it was understood that several attor-
neys who were interested in the bill
would be present. They had cases
in court which prevented their appear-
ance, however, and for this reason the
Senate, on Chillingworth's motion, de-
ferred action till next Wednesday.

The interesting statement is made
that the powers that be in the Re-
publican party do not wish to see the
measure go through, but that it is to
be killed in one way or the other.
