



THE SENATE

FIFTY-NINTH DAY.
Afternoon Session.

Another House resolution on Kea-
lawaa Park, Hilo, was referred to the
Hawaii delegation.

Coelho moved to defer consideration
of the resolutions on the Organic Act
until tomorrow, saying he and the
other two members of the health com-
mittee were going on a visit with
the Board of Health to Kalihii receiv-
ing station.

McCarthy seconded the motion, con-
sidering the matter too important to
be considered with three members ab-
sent.

President Smith suggested that the
proposed was an evasion of legisla-
tive responsibility.

Coelho made a warm reply and the
motion carried, making the resolu-
tions the order of the day after the
reading of minutes tomorrow.

2:07 the Senate took recess to the
call of the chair.

ing to the Sinking Fund for the Red-

The House notified the Senate of
its concurrence in Senate amendments
to House bills 231, 220 and 229; that
Senate Joint resolution 3 had passed
third reading in the House, as had
House concurrent resolution 30 provid-
ing for printing the proceedings at
the visit of ex-Vice President Fair-
banks to the Legislature. This last
was promptly adopted.

Another recess was taken, during
which Chillingworth suggested that,
after adjournment of the Legislature,
the Kaui members be presented with
the portrait of President Taft hang-
ing over the daisance they had got
everything else at this session.

Coming to order again the Senate
received House concurrent resolution
with regard to Palolo belt road, which
on motion of McCarthy was adopted.
The Senate then adjourned.
