THE LOG-BOOK

The Matson steamer Lurline, Captain Weeden, which was expected from the Coast this noon, will not arrive till late this evening. She has been delayed on account of an accident in which part of one of her propeller blades was broken. She brings no mail, having left after the Alameda.

It is reported that Captain Bent of the Tenyo Maru was quite painfully injured on board his vessel just after she had docked through a fall. He was coming down the companionway and slipped, bruising his body and injuring his leg.

Two sailors from the Dirigo complained to the Advertiser office last night that they had been ill treated in the matter of the investigation of the stores of the Dirigo. Both were intoxicated and the sight of an editorial pen frightened them from the office before the police appeared.

Chief Officer W. D. Watson, of the Mariposa, who has been on that steamer for 26 years, or even since she was built, has stated that he would make one more voyage to Tahiti and then give up seafaring life for good.

BOSTON, May 14.—Officials of the Pacific Mail steamship company denied today that any plan was under consideration for the abandonment of its oriental service, but admitted that no profits were being derived from the service and added if there was not a change within a year or so it might be deemed advisable to cease running freight vessels between those points. It was also stated that the company's line operating along the Pacific coast from San Francisco to Panama was doing a very poor business.

VICTORIA, B. C., May 13.—That a rate war will probably result between the two Japanese trans-Pacific lines, following the establishment next month of the Osaka Shosha Kaisha service in conjunction with the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad, is the news received in today's mail from Japan. The Ashai Shimbun of Tokio, in a lengthy article regarding the new steamship line, says the expectation is that a rate war will be commenced and the Nippon Yusen Kaisha will be expected to fight injurious competition on its North American line to Victoria and Seattle at the hands of the Osaka Shosha Kaisha.

The Osaka Shosha Kaisha has just borrowed \$1,000,000 on the security of the new steamers through the agency of Sale, Fraser & Co., of Yokohama, and will have five new steamers in service by next January and will draw subsidies amounting to \$500,000 annually from the Japanese government.

The Ashai Shimbun says that the Osaka firm will not be a member of the Pacific conference and will be able to compete in the matter of rates.
