NOT LIKELY TO GET RUSSIANS

Unless the sugar plantations, the promoters of the pineapple industry or the larger employers in some other line make application to the Territorial Board of Immigration for Russian labor, there is little chance that the plans of A. W. Perelstros will see any further end than that of newspaper publicity.

This statement was made today by one of the members of the Board of Immigration who said that he gave it as his personal opinion, however, not being able to speak for the rest of the Board. In speaking further on the subject he said:

"We have applications at present for 2000 Portuguese and Spaniards but not for labor of any other nationality. The Board will not attempt to introduce Russian or any other foreign labor unless it knows that it can state to the immigrants where, at what salary and under what conditions they will work if they come here. We will make no promises that we cannot fulfill and since we have received no application for Russians from any of the larger employers of labor we have certainly no chance to promise that they will be given work."

"I understand that Mr. Perelstros has visited Ewa wita Mr. Savidge and that on Monday he will visit Wailuku, but that does not mean that the Board of Immigration will go into the matter of bringing Russians here unless we know just where they will be given work. I understand that he wishes to take the job of procuring the immigrants if such a thing should be decided on. That is also a matter on which the Board would have to make a careful decision."

NAVY WIRELESS HAS PILIKIA

(Continued from Page One.) ested in the maintenance of a good wireless service between the islands, will be asked to take a hand in the matter. Whether they will take action by carrying the matter to the courts or possibly by personal letters to the parents of the boys who are causing the trouble, is a matter which will have to be decided later on.

Manager J. A. Balch, of the wireless company wrote to Captain Rees of the Naval Station a few days ago asking what difficulties had been encountered by the Government wireless and received a reply this morning. Captain Rees states that the working of the navy wireless has of late been seriously impeded by boys who are working private stations during the periods when official business is being transacted. It is quite possible that U. S. District Attorney Breckons may be asked to step in and see what he can do to stop the nuisance which is becoming more and more flagrant. In his letter to Mr. Balch Captain Rees says: Honolulu, July 15, 1909.

Sir:—(1) Referring to your letter of July 13, 1909, I have the honor to inform you that according to the report of the Equipment Officer of this station amateur wireless stations are believed to have been in operation in, or near, Honolulu for a year or more, but their interference has not been marked until within the last past few weeks. It may be that vacation is giving school boys more opportunity to experiment in this direction. Of late the interference has been sufficient to seriously impede or impair regular work, and the tendency to "break in" seems to indicate the presence of novices.

RAPID TRANSIT TO NAVAL STATION

At a meeting yesterday the Honolulu Rapid Transit & Land Co. ratified the final arrangements for extending its lines to Pearl Harbor naval station.

Part of the new rolling stock and material to purchase which Manager C. G. Ballentyne is now on the mainland is for the naval station extension.

When the extension is built there will be rapid transit facilities available to the United States military force from Diamond Head to Pearl Harbor, connecting with Fort Ruxxy at Waikiki. Probably the next thing will be a branch to connect either the Waikiki or Waialae line with Fort Ruger at the rear of Diamond Head.
