BUILDING BIG TRESTLE

OAHU RAILROAD COMMENCES WORK ON LARGEST STRUCTURE OF ITS KIND IN TERRITORY.

Work has been started by the Oahu Railroad on the largest railroad trestle in the Territory. The structure will be of wood and will span the gulch through which the north branch of the Kaula stream runs, on the new Halemana branch of the Wahaiwa section of the road. It will be five hundred and seventy-six feet long and will cross the gulch at a height of one hundred and five feet over the water. The pile work for the structure has been nearly completed and the concrete foundations are being started. The work has been somewhat held up by high water but is now progressing rapidly. When complete there will be about 200,000 feet of lumber in the new trestle. While some of the trestles used for plantation flumes are longer and higher there are none in the Territory that compare with it for size.

ONO DENIES HIGH WAGE CONNECTION

K. Ono, one of the defendants in the injunction suit of Oahu Sugar Co. against Makino and thirty-three others has made an answer for himself. He says he is a stranger to all the matters and things in the complaint. He denies all manner of unlawful combination or conspiracy with the other defendants or anyone. He disclaims any connection whatsoever with them or anyone in the demand of complaint for higher or any wages, or with any conspiracy, or with the Higher Wages Association, or with the Nippon Jiji newspaper other than that of a stockholder, or with any other paper, or with the labor upon complainant's plantation, or any other plantation, or any other labor.

FORTY FAMILIES OF RUSSIANS

The first definite request to the Board of Immigration for Russian laborers was made this morning in a communication received from the Planters' Association by President R. Ivers. The request is for forty families, which is thought to be enough to demonstrate clearly whether the labor from this source is suitable for the work here. The matter will be taken up by the board at a meeting to be held next week and Mr. Perelstrov will be asked to explain his plans in greater detail. Transportation matters in regard to the bringing of the Russians will be looked into, and if satisfactory arrangements can be made the plan will go ahead in the limited manner mentioned.

SOME STARTLING FIGURES

The total value of Hawaiian exports, of which sugar predominates, amounted to \$40,567,796.00 in 1908. This would represent \$225.00 per capita when proportioned according to the present estimated population of the islands, and when this is compared with the per capita money holdings in other countries Hawaii's lead over them is enormous. Estimated for one year by the last census the per capita wealth of the United States proper is \$31.40; of the United Kingdom \$17.58; of Germany, \$22.40; of France \$37.13; of the Netherlands \$26.75; and of Cuba \$15.62. Even though we add all of these other per capita amounts together that of Hawaii yet overtops the entire sum by \$74.11. LAUNCHING OF BIG DREDGER

It is expected that the "California," the big new dredger of the Hawaiian Dredging Company will be launched a week from today. It will be the largest vessel ever built in the islands and the work of placing the machinery in the big hull will be commenced as soon as she is in the water. The dredger will be of the clamshell type and it is thought that four weeks from now she will be ready to start work on the Pearl Harbor contract. On Thursday the fuel scow which has been built by the same company was launched. It holds about 200 barrels of fuel oil, which is to be supplied to the dredgers as they need it and in addition to this can supply 20,000 gallons of water, for use in the boilers of the big machines. As soon as the dredge is completed work will be rushed on the two new hopper scows, which will handle the material which the dredgers bring up from the bottom. They should be finished during the latter part of August. Work is rushing ahead, owing to the rivalry between the Hawaiian carpenters and the men who were brought down from the coast by the company. They are working in different gangs and each is striving to outdo the other in not only the amount of work done but the quality of the work. The results are showing for themselves.

The remains of the late W. G. Walker, manager of Ooakala, arrived this morning on the Mauna Kea from Hilo. Mrs. Walker is expected to arrive next week. It is her intention to take the remains to California for interment. John Walker returned this morning on the Mauna Kea. He and Mrs. W. G. Walker are anxious especially to thank the Masons and others in Hilo for their sympathy and kindness in the bereavement, and to express appreciation of the Hilo Masonic Lodge Services.
