NORWEGIAN SHIP SHORT OF WATER

NORDSTJERNEN, SEVENTY-SIX DAYS FROM HUACHCO PUTS IN HERE UNEXPECTEDLY.

The four-masted Norwegian ship Nordstjernen, Captain Bjaastad, dropped anchor in the roadstead at 8 a. m. today.

She is bound from Huachco, a South American port, for Port Townsend, in ballast.

The reason she put in here so unexpectedly was that the water went rotten and the ship made such slow time after leaving Huachco, that the captain was forced to put into Honolulu for a fresh supply.

The Nordstjernen, which is a vessel of 1,635 tons, took seventy-six days to come from Huachco to Honolulu. All are well aboard, though the shortage of drinking water has been keenly felt the last few days.

The vessel will probably get away for Port Townsend tomorrow. She has never been here before.

OAHU COLLEGE

GETTING A JURY

The selection of a jury with which to try the Waipahu riot case continued before Judge De Bolt this morning, the second venire being exhausted and a third issued. So far there have been eleven jurymen passed by the two sides, the names being as follows: J. K. Clarke, D. K. Martin, J. I. Bortfield, G. H. Greene, Sam Lelilio, J. F. Guild, B. R. Campbell, Allen Caster, S. F. Nott, J. H. Cummings, J. Trask. These are still subject to peremptory challenge by both sides. The defence has already used nine of its twenty challenges while the prosecution has waived all challenges up to the present time. It seems likely that a jury will be obtained tomorrow and that the trial will then commence.

FAREWELL WITHERS CONCERT.

The final Withers concert, which took place at the Opera House last night, was the best of the series. The feature was the playing of Madame Elzy, whose selections, especially toward the latter part of the program were by far the best in which she has been heard in Honolulu. Her Chopin Mazurka and Etude from Beranger were exceptionally delightful and called forth enthusiastic encores. The playing by Herbert Withers was perhaps the best which he has done in this city, in his case, as in the one just mentioned, the last selections being far to be preferred.

Charles Bennett outdid himself in the rendition of Kipling's Mandalay, as set to music by W. W. Hedgcock. The version was very different from that generally known and the minor of the third verse was exceptionally good. The Withers company in leaving Honolulu will leave very pleasant memories of their work behind, as seldom has the musical public had a chance to hear such perfection of art in their line.

MILLS IS MUDDLED

Today the city is being highly entertained by as funny a procession as ever decorated the streets, to wit: H. T. Mills and Former Chief of Detectives Jack Kalakiela driving around town with an express wagon and entering prominent places of business, hotels, cigar stores and other resorts of pleasure and trade for the purpose of collecting the frames which have for several months graced important points where people meet and which contain the Pathfinder, the Honolulu shipping guide of which Henry N. Almy, who is also United States Shipping Commissioner, is editor and manager.

Why Mills, the bill collector and garnishee expert, should be directing Kalakiela to seize all The Pathfinder frames, was more than the wisdom loving public could understand. At first it was suggested that Mills had turned messenger boy for Almy and was taking away the frames to give place to a wireless system of shipping information.

Investigation, however, developed the fact that Mills was laboring under the delusion that he was seizing Almy's property. The joke is on Mills, for Almy swears that he does not own the Pathfinder and never did own it.

Mills some time ago obtained a judgment against Almy in the sum of a hundred dollars or so for an alleged debt over which claim there has been litigation for some seven years and concerning which Mills took a grievance to Washington, the Washington authorities however, accepting Almy's explanation of the affair. The money claim grows out of the old Waikiki Inn license proposition and Almy has declared that he does not owe it and will not pay it. Mills, performing what he probably thought was an artistic stunt, uses Almy again on his wedding day and, finally, acting on some of his several judgments, celebrated California's Admission Day by going around town with a wagon to gather in Pathfinder frames which do not belong to Almy. Almy declares that Mills will have to explain his action and will be up against a disagreeable situation. Mills has a bond up and, if he has to make good for the frames to The Pathfinder, the costs and expenses will come out of that bond.

In the meanwhile The Pathfinder will continue publication, says Almy, the daily reports being delivered as usual.
