## THE POLAR REGION ANNEXED

### ATCHERLEY REVIEW

CIRCUIT JUDGE WILL ASCERTAIN IF TRIAL WAS VALID—WRIT ISSUED.

Mrs. Mary Atcherley this morning secured from Circuit Judge Robinson an order issued to Chairman Lindsay of the Lunacy Commission, commanding Lindsay to transmit to the circuit court the transcript of the stenographic report of the proceedings before the Lunacy Commission which committed Dr. Atcherley, petitioner's husband, to the insane asylum.

The transcript is ordered for September 16, that the circuit court may ascertain whether the proceedings before the Commission were valid.

In her petition, Mrs. Atcherley contends that her husband did not receive a fair trial inasmuch as certain desired witnesses were not allowed to be called, referring to a leper in the Kailhi station, the superintendent of the Kailhi receiving station, Attorney Thompson, a reporter, Mrs. Wayson, and others.

### MONEY FROM WILL WRIGHT

In the Circuit Court yesterday the Territory obtained a judgment against W. H. Wright, the Treasurer of Hawaii who absconded some years ago, for the sum of \$774.20, Bishop & Company, bankers, being garnishees. The judgment was satisfied this morning.

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### LINK MAY BUY A HILO PAPER

HILO, September 11.—Members of the Congressional party are today devoting much of their attention to matters pertaining to land conditions on Hawaii, many of them strongly expressing their convictions in favor of cutting up large areas to be settled upon by American citizens or those qualified for American citizenship.  
L. L. McCandless is exceedingly busy among the Congressmen seeing them all. He is armed with a map of the Island of Lanai and is in no mild manner attacking the Territorial administration with reference to the Lanai incident, and on land matters in general.  
McCandless is also laying the foundation for his campaign next year when he will run for Delegate to Congress.  
It is rumored here that Link may buy out one of the local newspapers, to boom his campaign.  
A portion of the Congressional party visited the volcano last night. Those who saw Kilauea last found a considerably increased activity over Pele's exhibition of the night before.

### KAPIOLANI HOME SITE AT KAIMUKI

FRANCISCAN SISTERS HAVE AN ELIGIBLE LOT IN THAT SUBURBAN DISTRICT WHICH HAS ADVANTAGES OVER THE LOCATION OF THE PRESENT BUILDING—AN APPROPRIATION OF \$15,000 AVAILABLE FOR ERECTION OF NEW STRUCTURE.

From the present outlook it seems likely that the new building for the Kapiolani Home, as the institution where the girls born on the Molokai settlement are cared for in this city, will be erected in Kaimuki, instead of near the Kailhi receiving station where it is now. The home is cared for by the Sisters of the Order of St. Francis, of the Catholic church, and through their generosity a site for the new building has been offered tentatively, which will be a great improvement over that now being used.  
The present site of the Kapiolani Home is on low land, close to the railroad track and the contagious hospital of the Board of Health, and for these reasons and that the city is gradually growing out in that direction, it is thought best to provide another location if it can be accomplished with good results all around. Unfortunately the Territory has no land available which is suitable for the purposes and for this reason the offer of the sisters is looked on with a

### NEW ASSIGNMENTS OF TEACHERS

Superintendent Babbitt, of the public school system, has made a number of assignments and transfers of teachers. ### JAIL TIME COUNTED

A plea in mitigation of sentence in the cases of the Waimanalo rioters was heard before Judge De Bolt this morning. It seems that after they had been sentenced an appeal was taken in the cases, while the men remained in jail, not being released on bond. Judge De Bolt decided to mitigate the sentences to allow the time which has expired since their sentence, which they have spent in jail as a matter of fact, to count on their sentences.

### FIFTY SAILORS ON POLICE DUTY

Half a hundred men from the eight cruisers at this port are doing police duty, their headquarters being established at the police station, where their officers occupy a room adjoining that of the Sheriff.  
The men, those of them not patrolling the city, make themselves comfortable on chairs and benches provided in the corridors.  
It is the duty of these guards to police the men-of-war men ashore. There are some seven thousand men or more in the fleet and there are almost two thousand ashore today.  
The provost guards, to be sure, have little to do other than mount guard, for the visiting sailormen, in the vast majority, are such as carry themselves to the credit of the Navy.

### KALAWAO COUNTY COMPLICATIONS

The little County of Kalawao is badly mixed up as the result of some of the laws passed by the last Legislature. The law which provided that the counties should look after the repairs and maintenance of the schools is causing some of the piffia, for the school authorities have called for brooms, etc., by requisition and the Board of Health has no money which can be applied to this purpose.

In regard to the same county President of the Board of Health Mott-Smith has more money than he knows what to do with. The law providing that the fines and costs in the district courts should be turned over to the treasurer of the county is the cause of this dilemma. Certain moneys have been collected from this source by the Sheriff of Kalawao but there is no county treasurer there to receive the funds. Mott-Smith has hedged by turning the entire matter over to the Attorney-General for an opinion.
