A request was received from the Reverend Dr. Griffes, U. S. Army chaplain, who is on the transport "Thomas," for literature and magazines of all kinds for the use of the soldiers on the transport. It is hoped that all townspeople who have any reading matter on hand will send it down to the transport before she sails.

The S. S. Alameda due here tomorrow will bring 377 sacks of mail. Her cargo consists of 1950 tons and she has 79 cabin and 23 steerage passengers.

Tonight the Kaahumanu Improvement Club will hold a special meeting to protest against the sale of certain lots in the Boardman tract to orientals. The lots in question are situated on Kinohi street near Kapiolani and are few in number, the great part of the tract having been sold to citizens.

# Kirkcudbrightshire In Port To-day

"Hello, cap, what's the name of the sailing vessel which got in this morning?"  
"I can't say it, but she's a British ship."  
Such was the conversation which took place this morning between a Star man and one of the veterans of the sea who make the pilot house their headquarters.

There is considerable excuse for the individual in question being unable to repeat the name of the incoming vessel over the phone. It was "Kirkcudbrightshire," a name of eighteen letters (count 'em) and one which could give more of the much vaunted long-distance Hawaiian names a handicap and a beating.

The Kirkcudbrightshire, a British ship of 1482 tons, belonging to Thomas Law & Sons of Glasgow, owners of the well known Shire line, is from Hamburg with a cargo of cement. She was built in Glasgow twenty-five years ago and is making her first call here.

Her skipper is Captain Roberts, well known here, having come to Honolulu previously in vessels of the Shire line.

The captain's wife and two children made the voyage with him.

The ship brought 500 tons of cement for here and has 8,500 tons of the same stuff for Seattle. Hackfeld & Co. are the local consignees.

Kirkcudbrightshire didn't come via the Horn but by the Australia-New Zealand-East Cape route; this in order to secure favorable winds.

It took the Britisher 142 days to come from Hamburg, a very good run. The leg from New Zealand was made in exceptionally smart time. Good weather was experienced on the whole, though the voyage was singularly devoid of incident. Few craft were seen but the Society and Astral island were sighted. A few sharks were caught at intervals by the sailors on whose hands the days bore heavily at times.

The officers of the ship are: chief officer, Mr. Gaudy; second officer, Mr. McLean; third officer, Mr. Turbine. The crew is made up mostly of Scandinavian and Dutchmen.

The vessel is lying at the Channel wharf.

## BIG SQUID CAUGHT WITH COWRIE SHELL

An interesting sight was witnessed along the waterfront near the Inter-Island wharves this morning. An ancient native brought in a very large squid or octopus which he had caught while fishing from his canoe by the old fashioned "lawia hee me ka leho" method. When the old man held the squid up by the head its tentacles reached the ground.

The natives, fifteen or twenty years ago, used to fish for squid with the cowrie shell, frequently, and it was in this manner that the big squid which was brought to shore this morning was taken.

The younger generation of Hawaiians hardly ever fish for squid with the cowrie shell, however, probably fearing to come to close quarters with the monster hee which are often by this device. They would rather poke about the shallows of the lagoon for the squiddlets whose capture entails neither risk nor personal discomfort.

In fishing for squid with the cowrie shell, one or more of the brighter-colored varieties are attached to a string. When only one is used an oblong pebble about the size of the shell is tied to the face of it, a hole is pierced in one end of the back of the shell, a line is passed through, and after being fastened there, allowed to hang a few inches below the shell, to which a hook, whose point stands almost perpendicular to the shaft or shank, is attached.

Only shells with small red spots breaking through a red-brown ground have an attraction for the hee, and it will not rise to any other kind.

Shells which have suitable spots on unsuitable background are given the desired hue by steaming them over a fire of sugarcane husks.

On arriving at the fishing-ground, the fisherman in pursuit of hee either chews up and spits upon the water a mouthful of kukui nut meat, to render the surface glassy and clear, or he uses the water-glass. He drops the shell into the water, and by means of the line swings it back and forth over a place likely to be occupied by a hee. The greedy animal perceives the shell, shoots out an arm and seizes it. If the bait is attractive, after a few minutes' hesitation another arm is placed around it, and then another, until at last the squid withdraws itself entirely from its hole, and hugs the shell closely to its body, oblivious of everything else. The fisherman then draws it rapidly through the water, and when it raises its head at the surface, pulls

It over the edge of the canoe and delivers a blow between the eyes with a club, which is generally fatal. Owing to the hee's quickness with its eight tentacles or arms, the fisherman has to be very rapid in his movements, as the animal would be no mean antagonist should it have an opportunity to seize him with its arms.

In the past a number of natives have lost their lives in struggle with the giant octopus and this has helped to make fishing for the animal with the cowrie, an unpopular diversion.
