**DR. ATCHERLEY  
PLEADS HIS OWN  
CASE IN COURT**

the relation of next friend. "What is it you wish to say?"

Mrs. Atcherley arose and repeated her husband's argument that the matter of evidence was one of the strongest points of his appeal, and therefore it was too late for the Territory to come in with a motion to repair its case.

With a few remarks the Chief Justice promised that the matter would receive most careful consideration.

Next came on a motion by Dr. Atcherley filed this morning, with affidavits by himself and his wife, for his release on bail pending the appeal.

As Mr. Milverton had been served with this motion only just before the court opened its hearing was deferred.

In his affidavit Dr. Atcherley told of restraints which he regarded as undue placed upon him in the asylum, also of the hardship of being prevented from treating certain patients for leprosy under a permit from the Board of Health which had only a year to run from the beginning.

Mrs. Atcherley in her affidavit mentions the lack of support for herself and five children from the fact that the income from her husband's practice has stopped on account of his confinement at the asylum since July 21. His patients have refused to pay anything unless he can be released from the treatment to such an extent that he can treat them at his home or otherwise. During this confinement of Dr. Atcherley she and her children have been refused permission to see him even in the presence of a guard or an officer of the institution. She says "that she knows that an attack is being made against the life of her husband," other statements made by her being literally as follows:

"That upon the 16th day of October she was granted the permission to see her husband to consult about the presentation of the present motion now before this court, and then saw by the change in his appearance that his health was very much reduced by the treatment to which he is being subjected to at the asylum. He then complained of the drugs that is being given him and that they were not those that he had prescribed for himself but were some of injurious substitute.

"That she has been married to him and lived with him for the past 17 years, and that during the whole of that period he has shown no signs of insanity or a danger to her and their five children, or a danger to the community.

"That she has been present during the times that he has appeared in court, when he has conducted his own case, and cross-examined witnesses, and she has seen that he was in full possession of his faculties on those occasions."

**THE KAHULUI WHARF PLANS**

Measurable progress was made yesterday with the Kahului wharf proposition submitted by the Kahului Railroad Company, in conference with Governor Frear on the subject were Superintendent of Public Works Marston Campbell, President and General Manager H. P. Baldwin, Second Vice-President W. R. Castle, Treasurer Joseph P. Cooke and Superintendent J. N. S. Williams, the last four being officers of the company.

Tentative plans and specifications for the wharf, together with regulations for public use, ways and means of upkeep, etc., were laid before the Executive.

Mr. Campbell will examine the plans and specifications and report as soon as possible. One of the provisions of the submitted agreement is that the Government may take the wharf over at any time that may be deemed expedient in the public interests.

A form of license will be drawn up, but the terms are not all settled yet. Several points are referred to Attorney General Hemenway.

This particular wharf is not the last word in Kahului docking facilities, it being intended merely for the inter-island steam fleet and lumber-carrying and merchant sailing craft. A wharf to accommodate the big freighters of the American-Hawaiian Steamship Company will be considered after more dredging of the bay has been accomplished.

Stocks have had a continued weak time of it since yesterday, although small transactions have been numerous. In a few instances slightly more strength seemed to show a part of the time, but the general basis of trading remained about the same. Certainly there was no suggestion of a boom in any of the figures. The San Francisco market remains dead, no extraordinary offers having been received from there in quite a while.

Between boards 5, 5 and 35 shares Onu sold at \$31.75, which indicates a little extra strength. For the stock \$31.50 was bid, holders demanding \$31.75.

Hawaiian Commercial sold at \$33.75, 40 shares changing hands. Holders of the stock were asking \$34. On the cards this morning five shares sold at the street figure, \$33.75.

Between boards 100 McBryde sold at \$4. For the stock was bid and \$4.25 asked.

Ewa appeared about the same, 25 and 10 shares selling at \$30.50. The bidding figure was still \$30.50, with \$31 asked.

A total of 300 shares Oiaa sold at \$5 flat. The same was offered for more, but holders demanded \$5.125.

Other minor stocks came in for slight dealing, among them being Koloa, 10 shares of which sold at \$147.50. Forty Brewery sold at \$23.25 and 7 shares Hilo Railroad went at \$12. Another side was 10 shares Waimea at \$110.
