His Imperial German Majesty's cruiser Arcona this morning cleared the harbor, forsaking her Naval wharf berth, and pointed her ram to sea, then swung toward Kailua and took a hawser from the British ship Celtic Chief which has been on the reef since Sunday night commencing to pull about 11 o'clock in an effort to dislodge the merchantman.

APPROPRIATION BILL FOR HONOLULU PASSES DESPITE FILIBUSTERING

In a session lasting three and a half hours last night, the Board of Supervisors passed on first reading the appropriation bill for the first six months of the new year. It carries a total of \$349,165 or an average monthly expenditure of \$58,026. This is about the same as the rate of expenditures for the closing 6 months, which have been swelled far beyond the appropriation bill by extra votes for road contracts, etc.

As presented to the board last night, after being adopted in a full caucus of the members last Saturday the total was \$315,256. All agreed on that occasion to stand by the bill at the board meeting, and beyond a few salary raises the promise was kept until roads were reached. Then Kane moved for an increase of the allowance for Ewa and this being granted there was an instant demand for more for the other road districts. Honolulu picked up \$4000 a month in-

crease, making its fund for roads and bridges, including the road tax, \$18,000 a month.

Most of the long session was taken up with filibustering tactics—first to defer the bill and finally to defeat it. Aylett, Kane and Ahia were the kickers, Aylett being on his feet speechifying at least two-thirds of the session.

Chairman Logan of the ways and means committee informed the recalcitrants that their action would result in tying up all business and work of the departments, depriving the families of laborers of their means of support, at the beginning of the year. He said their conduct was simply revolutionary and if they refused to perform their duties the only thing left was to petition the Governor to call a special session of the Legislature to revoke the municipal charter. Then he moved for reconsideration of the vote, Aylett interrupting with cries for adjournment.

Bro. Mathias Newell, inspector at Hilo, reported to the entomologist inspection of 121 lots and 2043 parcels of imports. Five cases of lemons were fumigated on account of purple scale and fifty sacks of River spuds received an overhauling before being passed.

Dr. Norgaard's report for animal industry was received just as the reporter was leaving. It was appreciatively commented on. The recommendations of Dr. Norgaard in reference to tuberculosis were adopted.

NEW MILK ORDINANCE

Supervisor Aylett last night introduced a milk ordinance, which was referred to the health and sanitation committee. He claimed to be the father of the milk and dairy ordinances that were vetoed by the Mayor, but opposed them at nearly every stage and contributed to their final defeat by absenting himself from the meeting when action was taken on the veto. His new bill is a skeleton of the dead ordinance, some of the most important provisions being omitted.

With regard to city officials delinquent in payment of taxes the ways and means committee recommended that the auditor request them to pay their tax arrears, in installments if desired by them, and report to the board those refusing or neglecting to make good. Kane alone spoke and voted against the adoption of the report.

thinning the forest on Tantalus, all the cutting to be done under supervision of representatives of the division.

One thousand trees each of the Jeffrey pine, Coulter pine, Incense cedar and Deodar cedar had been received by the Alameda on November 26, which were immediately transhipped for planting, respectively, on the upper slopes of Mauna Kea and Haleakala. They came through in excellent condition and should do well.

Mr. Haugh reports the approximate number of trees on hand at the Nursery and Makiki station as about 75,000.

Edwin M. Ehrhorn, entomologist, reported that of 30 vessels boarded in November fruit, plants and vegetables were found on seventeen. Passed as free from pests were 861 lots and 16,630 parcels, fumigated before releasing 9 lots and 16 parcels, burned 7 lots and 12 parcels.

A shipment in the China the last day of October of rice, beans, peas and other vegetable seeds had yielded from breeding two species of moths, the drug beetle and two weevils. The lot was treated with carbon bisulphide for 24 hours and after finding all insects dead were released. Interception of other pests were reported.

Four shipments of hornly parasites had been received from Mr. Koebel. Mention is made of the sudden abundant appearance of several species of

Sealed tenders, in duplicate, endorsed "TENDERS FOR BEEF CATTLE," will be received at the office of the Board of Health, number 12 o'clock, noon, Tuesday, December 21st, 1909, for supplying the Leper Settlement, Molokai, with beef cattle for the period of six months from January 1st, 1910, to June 30th, 1910, under the following conditions, namely:

1. The bidder must offer to furnish fat beef cattle to weigh not less than 350 lbs. net when dressed, in lots averaging about 60 head per month, more or less, as may be specified by the Superintendent of the Leper Settlement, delivered at the Leper Settlement, Molokai, and to accept the dressed weights ascertained at the Leper Settlement by said Superintendent. For further information apply at the office of the Board of Health, Honolulu.

2. Hides, tallow and offal to be the property of the Board of Health.

3. Each bid must be for the price per pound dressed weight, with an alternative offer of the price per head.

4. The successful bidder must agree that all cattle are offered for delivery subject to the right of the Superintendent of the Leper Settlement to reject any or all unfit for use, in which event other cattle must be forthwith furnished to make up the required number and those rejected forthwith removed at the expense of the bidder.
