TENNIS EXPERTS BADLY TREATED

The committee having in charge the ranking of American tennis players has just passed out a rough deal to Melville Long and Maurice McLoughlin, the experts who were recently here from Australia, incidentally defeating everything here en route. The San Francisco Call of February 1 has the following and a lot of detail about the matter:

American Lawn Tennis, the official organ of the United States national lawn tennis association, which arrived yesterday, contains the official ranking committee thereof. The latter is what we have been anxiously awaiting, and now that it is here the local fans still feel that Maurice McLoughlin and Melville Long, and particularly the former, were treated unfairly by the ranking committee. This despite the fact that the ranking was approved by the executive committee and despite the fact that the chairman of the ranking committee states that "the cloud of uncertainty surrounding the question as to whether the Pacific coast players should be ranked has been lifted in a most gratifying and decisive fashion."

The Pacific coast tennis interest are congratulated by the worthy chairman for furnishing in the first year of their eastern play the entire Davis cup team and the challenging team for our national doubles. Thus the California players are worthy of special mention, but should be satisfied with that, according to the ranking committee. Every fan in the city was "sore" at the treatment given McLoughlin, but pending the arrival of the committee's reasons for placing McLoughlin sixth instead of third, tennismen here had little to say when the ranking was first published. The following circular is being sent out:

"To the Ladies of Honolulu:

"These boys will be out Thursday, February 17, and we must be ready for them.
