## ENGLAND'S NATIONAL GAME NEXT SATURDAY

Next Saturday at Makiki Field the opening game of the cricket season will be played, the teams being the eleven representing Bishop & Co., and the team of the Honolulu Cricket Club. Twenty-two of the best men in the city will strive for honors with the broad bat and taking last year's form into consideration the H. C. C. members should annex the honors.

For the last few months cricket has been talked of by the devotees of the game and those who are fond of the great English sport will no doubt be on hand to watch the initial struggle of 1910. To any one who is not up on the fine points of the game, cricket has little charm but those who know every detail claim that it is interesting to say the least.

Included in the ranks of both teams are men who have played the game in "dear old England," and although some of them like our national game, they say there is nothing like cricket in England where championship matches are played most of the time, five days and even more are required, but here two innings are about all that can be played as it is seldom that two holidays follow each other, or on the other hand the players are unable to get off the required time to play such a long match. Cricket unlike any other game requires less practice to become proficient and for that reason local players are hardly ever seen on the field except when playing. To become a successful cricketer one has to be able to throw a swift straight ball with a stiff arm movement, and to be able to hit the ball at almost any angle on the field. Some of the men who will be seen in next Saturday's game are: Morse, Bailey, Anderson, Carson, MacCauley, Sinclair, Colburn, McConnell, Waterhouse, Beardmore, Gill, McIntyre and a number of others from a team will be picked.

All people and players who are interested are requested to be present at two o'clock to witness the game and to partake of the refreshments which will be served by the wives of the members.

### BOGEY TOURNAMENT.

"Colonel Bogey" the grand old man of golf, will have a number of competitors to play against him tomorrow on the links at Haleiwa, and judging from some of the scores which have been made lately on the links by the sea, the popular Colonel's best score will be beaten.

Quite a number of the best players in the Country Club will journey down this afternoon and early tomorrow to enter the play which will start on the arrival of the "Limited."

Reports from the hotel indicate that the course is in the best possible condition, and if the weather holds good a big list is expected to enter the tournament.

### INTER-ISLAND POLO.

Although actual practice has not started, this year's polo games promise to be more exciting than those played last year. The officers of Schofield Barracks are willing to enter a team this year, and within a few weeks a team will be picked to uphold the honor of the Cavalry. Maui players are very keen over the prospects of the mid-summer tournament, and their best men headed by Frank Baldwin will arrive here in plenty of time for the matches. Shingle, Denison and Potter are all available for the team and they will probably start active practice before very long.

Moanalu as usual will be the scene of the championship games and every one here knows what a beautiful field has been set aside for the use of the players.

A few weeks ago it looked very doubtful about polo this year, but in the last few days a good deal of interest has been aroused in the coming island series which are usually played in August.

### ALL READY FOR BALL

Fans from all over the city, especially those in the vicinity of Athletic Park, are waiting for Barney Joy's order to "play ball" tomorrow in the opening games of the 1910 Oahu league series. Every detail to assure the event being a success has been arranged, and by one thirty at least two thousand fans are expected to be inside the grounds to see the ceremonies attached to the opening, as well as to see the game between the C. A. C.'s and the Marines.

All four of the teams in the league have practiced hard to make Sunday a memorable one in baseball history, and their efforts will no doubt be rewarded as the four teams know a great deal about how baseball should be played.

Promptly at one o'clock, headed by the Hawaiian band, the members and officials of the league will start from the corner of King and Fort streets, and will march to the grounds where formal ceremonies will mark the opening of the season.

Bonnie will be on hand with his electric machine to take several rolls of films which will be produced at his cozy theater next week. Charles Hunsine Jr., who has consented to throw the first ball is confident that he can strike any man in the city out, and his efforts will no doubt be well rewarded.

Two games will be played every Sunday weather permitting, until the series are completed.

Baseball is evidently finished in the big league and as the Japanese team of the Oahu League have proved that they know the game, the future outcome will be that the Oahu leaguers will take the place of their rivals in the eyes of the many fans who would walk miles to see a good fast game of baseball.

Baseball has come to stay in Hawaii, and the public always shows their interest by journeying down to see the minor leaguers play the game.

### READY FOR REFEREE.

Every thing has been arranged for the boxing matches which will be held tonight at the Princess rink, and if clear weather prevails the spacious pavilion should be packed to the doors. Promoter McFadden has worked hard to make tonight's show a success, and his efforts deserve reward.

The men who will box for honors, are trained to the last minute and they will no doubt give the fans twenty-five rounds of good clean sport.

McCollough and Wahilani who will furnish the main event on the program are ready for the forty-five minutes of give and take, and their friends will be out in force to give them plenty of encouragement. The first preliminary will start promptly at 8:15, and McFadden promises no long waits in between which have been so noticeable in all previous boxing matches in Honolulu.

### BIG GAMES TODAY

This afternoon at the league grounds four teams of the Military league will meet for supremacy on the baseball field, and if the games are like last Saturday's, the fans will see good ball.

Sergeant Barry has recruited a number of crack players for his team as well as for the National Guard, and the future soldiers in case of war, will fight it out for championship honors, which Barry says are surely theirs.

The first game will start at 1:30 sharp, to be followed by the record game at 3:30. The Artillery and Infantry teams will play the first games with the Marines and Guards for the attraction in the second.

On Sunday Barry's Hospital Corps team will journey out to Leilehua, and will try hard to annex the honors from the boys of the "fighting 5th."

### HAWAII TO TUNE UP.

Although there is no race scheduled for tomorrow, a number of yachts including the Hawaii will have a day's yachting over the regular triangular course for the purpose of tuning the Hawaii up. Captain Wilder is anxious to give the cup aspirant a number of trials before he starts for the coast, so that he will know exactly her best points. The pride of Hawaii is a much faster and better boat on the wind than she is before it, but with certain changes that have been made recently, Wilder hopes to have her equal on both points. Before she leaves for the coast next month she will be put on the marine railway and given a good overhauling, as the committee want her to be in the best possible trim when she starts out. If

The race will be started and finished if assured at the Capitol grounds, the time limit to qualify being not more than five hours and a half. Any suggestions regarding the race will be welcomed by the Star, which believes in all branches of clean sport.

### FOREST FENCE AT PUPUKEA.

Sealed tenders will be received at the office of the President of the Board of Agriculture and Forestry, at the Capitol, Honolulu, until 12 o'clock noon of Saturday, April 30, 1910, for constructing wire fences along certain boundaries above the Pupukea-Paumotu Homesteads, Koolauloa, Oahu. It is required that approximately 9,000 feet of fence be constructed, in accordance with specifications that may be obtained upon application at the office of the Superintendent of Forestry, at the Government Nursery, King Street, Honolulu. Bidders will state the total amount for which they will construct the fence. It is to be understood that additions to or deductions from the approximate length of boundary to be fenced, specified above, shall be made at a corresponding rate per hundred feet.

It is required that a certified check be filed with the tender and that of proper bond be executed by the successful bidder.
