JUDGE HART PASSES AWAY

Judge Charles F. Hart died at his home at Waikiki yesterday afternoon. He had suffered for several months from grippe and complications. Death came at 1 o'clock, his wife and two daughters being at the bedside. He was seventy-six years old, and had been a resident of the islands since he was sixteen. In 1850 he arrived in Honolulu from England, after rounding the Horn. He went in the wine and liquor business, as Richardson & Hart, but after several years went to Hawaii. He established himself as a planter. He settled in Kona, but afterwards removed to Kona, and established the Nihiu plantation, of which he was the owner. He married in 1869.

For twenty-six years he was circuit judge on Hawaii under the old regime.

Judge Hart leaves a wife and two daughters, Mrs. Francis Gay and Mrs. Charles S. Elston.

The funeral services will take place this afternoon at St. Andrew's Cathedral commencing at 3 o'clock.

JOHN EMMELUTH DIED LAST NIGHT

John Emmeluth died last night at ten o'clock at the Queen's Hospital, after an operation for bladder trouble, the operation taking place during the afternoon. He had been suffering several months, but continued at work. On Thursday he was taken to the Queen's Hospital by John Wilson, street supervisor.

Mr. Emmeluth came to Honolulu from Atchison, Kansas, thirty-one years ago. He was born in Cincinnati, and had passed his fifty-seventh birthday on May 6. He leaves a son, John Emmeluth Jr., living in Oakland, Cal.; also four sisters, Mrs. Phoebe Geros, Atchison, Kas.; Mrs. H. H. Butler, Raton, N. M.; Miss Christine Emmeluth, Cincinnati; and Miss Molly Emmeluth, in Honolulu. He came here in 1879. He became manager of the house furnishings goods firm of Segelken Bros., which was founded in 1868. He bought out the Segelken interests and in 1881 the firm name was changed to J. Emmeluth & Co. His partners were W. E. Foster and J. J. Lecker. He eventually bought in the interests of his partners, Mr. Lecker remaining with him as manager.

Mr. Emmeluth was among those instrumental in the overthrow of the monarchy. He became a member of the Advisory Council under the Provisional government and took a part in the suppression of the revolution of '95. After annexation Mr. Emmeluth sided with the Home Rule party and became its leader. He was elected to the lower house of the first Hawaiian legislature.

When the Democratic party was in process of formation Mr. Emmeluth became one of its leaders. The funeral of the late Hon. John Emmeluth will be held at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon from H. H. Williams' undertaking parlors, interment being in Nuuanu cemetery. Services will be conducted at the parlors by Rev. H. H. Parker. A general invitation is extended to citizens, the parlors to be open from 9 o'clock in the morning.

The pallbearers will be L. L. McCandless, W. A. Kinney, Judge W. S. Edging, Mayor J. J. Fern, Senator Frank Harvey, Sheriff W. P. Jarrett, John H. Wilson and Joseph M. Poepoe.
