DRAMATIC TRIUMPH

About a third of those who should have been at the Opera House last evening to see Henry McRae's production of Shakespeare's "Taming of the Shrew" were enthusiastic over the surprising completeness of the difficult old English comedy.

The stage settings were not only appropriate but beautiful, the garden scene at the opening of the play being superseded in its forest bower effect in the last act, when warm applause greeted the glory of the composition on the rise of the curtain.

There was the wedding feast spread in a long table, al fresco, with the golden goblets of wine and a huge white wedding cake of many tiers upon which a hundred tiny candles scintillated. Round this board were the merry guests. Katharina the Shrew was a symphony of loveliness in her white satin wedding gown heavily embroidered in gold, seated under a canopy of festooned Japanese lanterns.

The company throughout managed their difficult roles remarkably well, the blank verse of Shakespeare and the exactitude of its perfect accent being a terror to every actor unfamiliar with its Herculean study.

Henry McRae made a striking Petruchio in more ways than one, his makeup closely resembling the Italian type with a black wig and mustachios and his aptitude for using a black-snake whip causing even the audience to tremble. He wore in the first and last acts the costume of the period with a cloak of cardinal velvet applique and a red plush hat bearing beautiful white plumes.

Baptista was portrayed by Louis Morrison, whose acting in a Shakespearean role betokened many years of experience. His deep rich voice was gratifying and his manner as composed as though his were a minor instead of a leading part.

George Webb was exceedingly handsome in his pearl gray, and afterward black and gold, hose and doublet and was perfectly at ease.

The scene in the second act between Bianca (Laura Hudson) Lucentio (G. Wray) and Hortensio (Geo. Webb) wherein each suitor was disguised as an instructor to win the heart of the fair lady, was delightful. It was brimful of delicious humor, and the scene was handled perfectly by these three clever people.

Charles Royal as Petruchio's jester was a hit with all, his remarkable nose, and yellow wig and unsymmetrical limbs being the incentive for much laughter at every appearance. Mr. Royal deserves great praise for the manner in which he handled this very difficult part.

Louise Melrose was the most handsome Curtis imaginable and her lines though short revealed great aptitude for Shakespeare. Her voice was vibrant and sweet and the bit of acting she had occasion to do was cleverly done.

To Sherman Bainbridge a crown of laurels is due, since without a hitch of even a second he delivered the speech which is believed by every actor and proclaimed by the late Edwin Booth to be the most difficult one in all Shakespearean plays. It is when he rushes in as a messenger and breathlessly describes in the difficult English words of that time the ludicrous attire of Petruchio.

Margaret Oswald, as Katharina the Shrew, was the most beautiful woman that in all her many parts here she has ever been, and interpreted the headstrong, vivacious, capricious, hot-tempered and later the meek, humble, subdued and charming Katharina, with remarkable ability, and those who saw her in "When Knighthood Was in Flower" should not miss her in this part which is so suited to her. She wore an auburn wig with little rippling curls all over her shoulders and appeared in three exquisite gowns. The first was a chantly lace robe over apple blossom pink silk, on train, and held round the waist with a heavy white cord. The next, her wedding gown, was a creation of white satin heavily embroidered in gold, while the last was another lace gown over lavender with gracefully flowing sleeves.

Particularly remarked by the connoisseurs was the uniform excellence of the support and the complete mastery of the lines by all.

Ivan Miller, James Dillon, Frank Howe and M. R. Stone besides those already named, did the justice of stars to their respective parts.

Speaking of stars, a great merit of this production by the McRae company is that it is not a showing off of stars, but an artistically symmetrical rendition of all the parts clear through to the supernumeraries, and even the "supes" seem to imbibe the spirit of the play in their stirring business of the third act, when the mirthful faculties of the audience were last night stirred to the depths.


