TRAVELLER TALKS
ABOUT HONOLULU

The Rockford (Ill.) Star of May 17
says:

Charles A. Payne, a "traveler with
a love of nature, a passion for his-
tory and a genius for friendship," was
heard last night at the First Congrega-
tional church in a lecture on
"Beautiful Hawaii" illustrated by stereo-
scopic views of the islands and
their surroundings and people

His lecture is the result of travel
and observation and was beautifully
phrased and highly instructive. This
gem of the Pacific, now a possession of
the United States, has been lauded
in song and story and its beauties
have been described many times, but
the living verity of the lecture of last
night gave it a clearer setting than
it has had before.

Mr. Payne is a pleasing speaker
and his lectures are always enjoyed
thoroughly, giving entertainment
along with instruction in a way to
charm his hearers.

Sunday evening as a special favor
he lectured on Rome and the martyrs
to a large audience and was finely re-
ceived.

BISHOP ESTATE
LOSES CASE

After a trial of twenty-three days,
the jury in the ejection case of the
Bishop Estate versus Kalelabe de-
cided in fifteen minutes yesterday af-
ternoon in favor of the defendant.

The defense claimed land in Wa-
tertown by adverse possession from
1855, when the land was owned by
Kalelabe's grandparents, who were
succeeded in possession by his moth-
er, Kahue. It was also shown by
evidence that the family has contin-
uously lived on the land and that it
has been fenced since 1855.

E. C. Peters represented the de-
fense and Judge Stanley appeared for
the Bishop Estate.

POLICE REPORT

Sheriff Jarrett reports to the Su-
pervisors that, during May, there
were 415 arrests out of which 324
were convicted, 15 of the balance be-
ing still held to answer. Out of the
amount, 244 were gamblers, an ex-
tra large majority of whom were con-
victed, their fines amounting to \$149,
25. The total receipts from fines came
to \$2,368.50, several convicted illegal
liquor sellers adding to the amount.

ONION HINTS.

Freshly gathered young onions
should be eaten freely. If you do not
digest them easily, eat them with
salt. It is said that a sprig of pars-
ley dipped into vinegar and chewed
slowly will destroy onion odor on the
breath. A hint of onion in a salad
renders it more delicious, but it
should only be a hint. Rub the onion
on the bowl in which you are going
to make the dressing. Knives used

in cutting or peeling onions should be
immediately rinsed in hot water and
rubbed with sand soap. If not thor-
oughly cleaned when the knives used
for another purpose the onion flavor
may be given to some dish to which it
is not acceptable.
