ADMIRAL BECKLEY DIES IN FRISCO

George C. Beckley, long known by his hosts of friends as "Admiral," died yesterday morning in San Francisco, having arrived there from Honolulu on the Matsun steamship Wilhelmnia. Mr. Beckley died of cancer of the stomach. After many months of ill-health he went to the coast in the hope of prolonging his life. He had set his heart on going to San Pedro to witness the departure of the yacht Hawaii in the transpacific race to Honolulu, on July 9.

George C. Beckley was born on the island of Hawaii, on May 5, 1849, at Waimea. For forty years he followed the sea. He was born in humble circumstances although his ancestors were of the highest rank. His sister, Mrs. Maria Beckley Kahoa, a court lady during the Kamehameha reign just prior to the accession of King Kalanikoua, died last year, also of cancer.

Mr. Beckley was the son of the High Chiefess Kahini and of William Beckley, the latter being the son of Capt. George Beckley, a foreigner who was the first military commander of the old Honolulu fort at the foot of what is now Fort street, and one of Kamehameha the Great's advisors.

NEW RECORD MADE

The open golf tournament held at Haleiwa all day Sunday was won by Austin White, champion golfer of Hawaii, with a score of 77. De Mena and Irwin finished with a 78 and 79 in the order named. White played from scratch while the other players received a handicap.

Before playing in the tournament White in practice made a new record of 71 for 18 holes. The former record of 74 held by Downey, was made several years ago.

White leaves for the coast on the next Sierra and will not be here this year to defend his title.

POLICE COURT

In spite of the fact that no session of police court had been held for three days, only thirty three cases were on this morning's calendar before Judge Andrade.

Joe de Ponte until recently a collector for the automobile stand owned by C. H. Behn and George C. Beckley Jr., waived examination this morning on a charge of embezzlement and was committed to the circuit court for trial.

Tai Kau was found guilty of selling opium without a license and was fined \$50 and costs.

L. R. M. Dambrosky was fined \$13 for assault on a fellow countryman, J. Roberts and Fred Noa, same offense, were reprimanded and discharged.

Nine gamblers were fined \$8 each for shooting craps. Komo and Kalua were each given thirty days imprisonment for being drunk. Nine others were fined \$4 each.

The rest of the cases were continued.

CONSPIRATORS ARE RELEASED

F. K. Makino, T. Tasaka, Y. Soga, and Negoro, instigators and promoters of the Japanese strike last year, received a Fourth of July gift in the shape of unconditional commutation of their jail sentences. When released they were met outside of Honolulu jail by a large body of their fellow countrymen, who enthusiastically cheered and welcomed them and escorted them into town. The clemency was in the following form:

"I, E. A. Mott-Smith Acting Governor of the Territory of Hawaii, moved by just cause made known to me, do hereby in accordance with the power in me vested, grant unto F. K. Makino, who was convicted in the Circuit Court of the First Judicial Circuit, Territory of Hawaii, at the January term 1910, of an offense of conspiracy in the third degree, and sentenced to be imprisoned for the period of ten months, and to pay a fine of three hundred dollars and cost of court amounting to \$6.37. Said sentence is hereby commuted so that it will expire on the fourth day of July, 1910.

"In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the Territory to be affixed.

Done at the Executive Building in Honolulu, the second day of July, A. D. 1910.

J. S. M'CANDLESS HURLED FROM AUTO

Late Sunday afternoon James S. McCandless was hurled from an automobile on the road between the Volcano House and the Kilauea pit, Hawaii, and sustained two broken ribs and narrowly escaped with his life.

It appears that President James A. Kennedy, of the I. I. S. N. Co., and Mr. McCandless had gone to the Volcano House for the purpose of getting water for the large party of excursionists at the pit. On the way back Kennedy ran the machine and McCandless, stooping forward, was holding onto the water bottles.

At a point about one and a half miles from the volcano and machine skidded to the side, striking the low stone wall and breaking an axle. McCandless, who was already leaning forward, "kept on going," plunging over the wall and falling eight or ten feet down the bluff, landing upon a rock.

Dr. Grace was hastily summoned from Hilo and found Mr. McCandless suffering considerable pain. Upon examination it was discovered that two ribs were broken.

The injured man was brought to Hilo late yesterday, put aboard the Mauna Kea and arrived in the city this morning. On the way down he was attended by Dr. Frank W. Ritson, of the Queen's hospital, who happened to be a fellow passenger.

Mr. McCandless (otherwise "Sunny Jim") will be around again in ten days or two weeks.

SECRETARY OF WAR PASSES THIS WAY

"The principal object of my visit here, so far as Hawaii is concerned, is to look after the defenses of the islands, and the military posts, and I will say to you, what you probably already know, that the United States government has some rather ambitious plans in connection with the extension of these posts and the military establishment here, and it is probable, in the near future that there will be a considerable increase in the number of soldiers that will come from the United States and remain here as a permanent garrison."

The above is the statement of Secretary of War Dickinson, en route round the world, who has just passed through Honolulu in the S. S. Siberia. The War Secretary spent yesterday viewing the Pearl Harbor works, Diamond Head fortifications and the Fall attending a banquet in his honor at the Young hotel, the feast being given and attending a banquet in his honor at Merchants' Association.

ROMANTIC WEDDING

Quite a romantic wedding took place at Hilo upon the arrival of the Mauna Kea there last Sunday, the parties being Miss Elsie May Ibbotson—known locally as "Miss Ibsen," an actress—and August Henry Reinecke, bacteriologist of the Territorial board of health.

The bride was already in Hilo, playing at one of the theaters there with brother and sister. A friend secured the license for Reinecke and District Magistrate Charles Swain tied the sacred knot.

A few minutes prior to the wedding the brother of the prospective bride appeared on the scene and ordered that proceedings be stopped. Upon meeting with a refusal by both parties the brother started to take legal proceedings, but the knot was tied before he could carry out his threat. The brother claimed that the girl was not of legal age; the girl gave her own age, however, as 19.

Be that as it may, Mr. and Mrs. Reinecke were spending their honeymoon at the Hilo hotel at last accounts and were as happy as could be.

Late Monday Mrs. Reinecke notified the manager of the theater at which she was playing that she would finish her engagement, despite a rather tempestuous wedding.

ARMY TRANSPORT LOST.

The army transport Indianapolis, which has been used to make regular trips between Manila, Corregidor and Grande Island, was sunk in 20 fathoms of water yesterday afternoon about 2 o'clock by striking a log one mile off Luzon Point. There were 29 members of the crew and six passengers on board, all of whom were saved.
