# NOTHING IN BRIBE CHARGES

Territorial grand jury yesterday afternoon reported to Judge Cooper as follows:

"We, the grand jurors, respectfully submit as a final report that we have investigated and acted upon cases as presented in the partial reports from time to time.

"A case in which the body of an infant was cremated by the morgue attendant on the authority of a telephone message from the police department and without the examination of a physician, having been brought to our attention, we feel that such loose methods of procedure are to be deprecated and recommend that no disposal be made of a body by cremation or otherwise, except under written authority from some properly qualified officer.

"In view of the many cases that have been brought to our attention of accidents from automobiles, we feel that the public safety demands a more rigid enforcement of Ordinance XI, 'Regulating moving travel and traffic upon the streets,' etc. We recommend that a higher standard of efficiency and general responsibility be required of applicants for drivers' licenses. We recommend the extension of the fifteen mile speed limit to Kamehameha IV road on King street, on account of the narrowness of King street in that locality, the absence of sidewalks, and the fact that large numbers of children use this road going to and from school.

"We have made a careful investigation of the statements made to the grand jury by Supervisor Aylett regarding an attempt to bribe him to fouldard, or at least ties beneath their sailor collars.

Shaded plumes, or the speckled effects are favored in Paris; but, after all, the elegance, durability, and becomingness of black feathers is undeniable, and over here will be most generally adopted.
