FINAL HONORS FOR WASEDAS

Professor Abe and the members of the Waseda baseball team were the guests of the Oahu baseball league at a luncheon given last night at Nottley Hall. This was the last event given in honor of the players who have made themselves popular with the baseball fans of Hawaii by their gentlemanly manner and sportsmanlike behavior on the ball field. A large number of people were present at the luncheon, which started at 6:30. After dinner speeches were made by a number of the guests.

Although nothing definite has been decided, it is more than likely that the Wasedas will be seen in action again next year on their way to and from the coast. Arrangements are being made for the Kelo team to come next year at the same time as the Wasedas and play a series of games with the local teams. The Waseda team will play in Chicago next summer with the team from the University of Chicago as well as the other college teams in the middle west.

Full details regarding the coming of both teams will be announced shortly after the visitors arrive home on the Tenge Maru. Manager Marcellino stated this morning that negotiations were being made at the present time with the officials of Kelo university, relative to the team coming next year for a series of games in Honolulu. It is possible the series will be started some time earlier than the series this year with the Wasedas.

SOUTHERN LAD WINS HONORS.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 16.—Fred Clifton Thomson, the world's all round champion for 1910-11, is the youngest athlete who has ever attained the honor, having just entered his twenty-first year. He has been the chief point winner of his alma mater, Occidental College, Los Angeles, for the last four years and succeeded in establishing a record for individual track work during the spring track season as a finale to his collegiate athletic experience by taking six firsts and running a lap in the winning relay team against one of the strongest track teams in southern California.

Thomson began his athletic training while attending Occidental college. His particular pride was the weight events and high hurdles, and during the track season when the older stars were training he practiced daily in these events, and as he gradually became stronger and heavier he increased his records in proportion.

The big boy made his debut as a football star, and was selected as the most promising material for the all star California football position during the last two years of his gridiron career. In the spring of 1906 he came into the limelight of western track athletics by setting a new mark for the southern California conference colleges in both hurdles. From that time forward his path was cut out and his own records fell before his increase in strength and skill season after season.

Harry Trotter is the only man in the west to be able to boast of a victory over the Los Angeles giant in the 16 pound shotput, and in the hurdle races Thomson has never recognized an equal.

Thomson's records in the track events are as follows: 100 yard dash, 16 2-5 seconds; 220 yard dash, 23 2-5; 880 yard run, 5 minutes; two mile

run, 11 minutes 10 seconds; pole vault, 9 feet 10 inches; high jump, 5 feet 8 inches; broad jump, 21 feet 10 1/2 inches; hammer throw, 126 feet; shotput, 45 feet 2 inches; discus throw, 118 feet; 120 yard hurdles, 15 4-5 seconds; 220 yard hurdles, 25 1-5 seconds.

GOOD BOUTS ARE PROMISED.

Seats for the Cordell-Cornyn 15 round go at the Orpheum theater on Saturday night are going fast, although there are a few good ones left.

E. J. Love, who is making his debut as a boxing promoter, has signed up Thompson of Eiseco and Scotty of Honolulu for a four round go, the men to weight in at 135 pounds.

The second preliminary of six rounds will be between Coll of the Marines and McGurn of San Francisco who is training with Jack Cordell.

Scotty a year and a half ago fought an eight round draw with McCollough, but has not been seen in the local ring since. Thompson is an unknown quantity, but his friends claim that he has a number of good punches which he will use in an effort to get the decision over Scotty.

Coll is rounding into shape under the management of the boxers at Camp Vero, and will be in good condition when he steps into the ring to meet McGurn.

Cordell and Cornyn are both working hard for their go, which promises to be a fast one from start to finish.

Cordell is confident that he will get the decision over Cornyn, although he realizes that he will have to extend himself to the limit to do it.

The first preliminary will be started promptly at 8:30, the big go being scheduled to start at nine thirty. Mike Paton will referee the big match with Jimmy Fox the third man in the ring in the preliminaries.

MISS SUTTON WON'T PLAY.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 6.—Word has come up from Southern California to the effect that Miss May Sutton will not be on hand for the State championship tennis tournament which commences on the courts at the University of California the 24th of this month. Miss Sutton intended to make the trip but for some reason or other has changed her mind. The fact is deeply regretted by the local followers of the sport, as they have been looking forward to another meeting between Miss Sutton and Miss Hazel Hotchkiss for the title.

Miss Sutton explained in her communication that as she was surely coming up to Del Monte for the Coast championship in September she thought it best to await another meeting with Miss Hotchkiss till then. Though Miss Sutton will not be on hand for the State event the tournament will be an interesting one. Miss Hotchkiss will play and she is practically conceded the championship, but she will have to play good tennis to win.

Mrs. George Coulter of Honolulu, the champion of the islands, will be present and those who have seen her play are of the opinion that Miss Hotchkiss will have considerable difficulty in disposing of her. Miss Golda Myer of the Ladies' Annex Tennis Club is another player who must be considered. Miss Hotchkiss has defeated her on numerous occasions in the past but she does not outclass her to the extent that Miss Myer has not a chance.

Then, too, the men's event will be of interest. Melville Long and George James will both be in the competition and it is likely that one or two good players will be on hand from the southern part of the state. Long and James will probably be the best players entered, however, and the championship undoubtedly lies between them. The tournament will commence on the 24th of the month and continue for three or four days. The courts at Berkeley are in the best possible shape and from the comment around the tennis clubs the matches will be well attended.

Local players at present in the East are doing exceptionally well, and if they continue their good work this

Coast will be considered quite a factor in the tennis world. Though McLoughlin was defeated in the New York State championship event by a player who rates around the thirty mark in the annual rating of players, he has shown to good advantage in all of the other tournaments in which he has participated.

It was with quite a little satisfaction that the followers of the game here read the success of McLoughlin against Wallace Johnson and Nat Niles in different tournaments. It will be remembered that both of these players were placed ahead of McLoughlin in the ranking of players last year. Local enthusiasts were convinced that McLoughlin was a better man than either Johnson or Niles, and this tournament along with those which are to come will prove it. McLoughlin won from Johnson in the Longwood event, and then at Southampton this week he disposed of Niles with comparative ease. Niles won the first set 9-7, but McLoughlin took the second and third, 6-2 and 6-4, respectively.

Not only has McLoughlin been successful in the East. Henderick and Bundy won the preliminaries to the National doubles championship event and will play Hackett and Alexander for the title. Long also won the first National clay court championship tournament.
