WORKING FOR VOLCANO PARK

PLANS TO MAKE THE VOLCANO A RESERVATION FOR NATIONAL PARK PURPOSES.

Once more the question of providing a national park for these islands has cropped up, for a conference was held at the University Club a few days ago, at which were present, the Governor, Starston Campbell, A. H. Ford and Mr. Irwin, secretary of the Trail and Mountain Club. As a result of that conference the governor is now busy investigating to see what form of statute would have to be drafted. The present proposal is to make the park at Kilauea and it will be necessary to acquire some land from the Bishop Estate. This matter was first mooted about two years ago, and so far it has not got very far, but it is hoped that soon something definite will be arranged.

A. L. C. Atkinson has been asked by a special resolution of the board of supervisors of Hawaii to use his influence to retain the gang of prisoners which has been working on the Halemaunau road, for other work in Hawaii county.

Forester Hosmer went to Hilo last week, and visited the new ohia forest on some of the lands of the Ka-papaia Ranch in Kau. He also went to Puna to inspect the lumbering operations at Pahoa and at Kaeleau.

Doctor Ramus, head of the federal quarantine service here, while in Hilo last week with President Mott-Smith of the board of health, picked out a site for a quarantine station on the outer side of the breakwater.

The jury retired yesterday afternoon at ten minutes past twelve to consider its verdict in connection with the charge of assault with intent to commit murder, against a Chinese named Yanagi. THE MOTHER'S PROBLEM

Of Raising Strong, Healthy Girls.
A serious problem which presents itself to every mother with girls to raise, in these days. 
