CHINA IN MONDAY.

The Pacific Mail steamer China is expected in from the Coast on Monday next. She will go to the Hackfeld wharf instead of to the naval wharf. The company's coal is at the Hackfeld wharf and the China will be coaled there this trip. This is the 100th trip across the Pacific by the China and there are rumors that she will make an attempt to beat her previous best time across to China.

The army transport Logan sailed from San Francisco on December 5 for Manila with a large number of cabin passengers and about 300 casuals in addition to the headquarters, band and eight troops of the Eighth Cavalry. There are 150 passengers in the first cabin and 70 in the second cabin. F. J. Dougherty, quartermaster's clerk, who has been on sick leave for some months, has reported for duty and is in charge of the Logan's clerical force.

PASSENGER ON ASIA DIED

The Pacific Mail steamer Asia arrived at the Alakea street wharf shortly after eight o'clock this morning, with eighty passengers in the saloon and sixty-six in the steerage. The passengers for Honolulu number seven only, comprising Mrs. F. M. Brooks, Masters Philip and Wendell Brooks, Robert Forrest, K. Mori, T. Tanaka, and Mr. Tuykendall.

The cargo for Honolulu totalled 963 tons, general merchandise, including rice, saki and soy. The trip across from Japan was pleasant except for the first twenty-four hours out from Yokohama. The weather during that short period was rough but thence to port it was delightful. At Yokohama C. J. Cooper, an instructor in the Kamamoto School, Japan, was brought on board suffering from chronic nephritis, but on the 2nd he passed peacefully away. He was 59 years old. His remains were not buried at sea, but are being taken on to the States where they will be forwarded to his relatives. Naturally the death of a fellow-passenger cast a gloom over the ship for some days.

Among those who are passing through on the Asia are the following: Mr. and Mrs. S. G. Lane, of Manila; Mr. and Mrs. E. O. Murphy and family of Hongkong and Mr. G. Grimes, of the Federated Malay States. Mr. and Mrs. Lane are well known in Manila, Spencer Lane being connected with Peacock's jewelry house. They are making a Christmas visit to their old home, and will return shortly to Manila. Mr. Murphy was at one time chief engineer in one of the Empress boats, running from Vancouver to Hongkong but several years ago he resigned from the service and entered a ship-building establishment in Hongkong. He has now retired and is on his way home.

THE ZEALANDIA

After a voyage from Vancouver extending over seven days and sixteen hours the Canadian-Australian steamer Zealandia arrived in port at six o'clock this morning and sailed again for Australia at two o'clock. The Zealandia has a large passenger list for Australia, of whom 47 were booked through from Vancouver. She also has a full cargo on board, but all she brought for Honolulu were 200 drums of codfish, 202 sacks of dried blood and general sundries.

THE ZEALANDIA

The vessel left Vancouver at 2:15 on the afternoon of the 2nd inst., and left Victoria a few minutes after ten o'clock that evening. For four days after leaving Victoria the Zealandia experienced strong southwest winds and head seas, but by the seventh inst. the seas had moderated and thence to port fine weather and smooth seas prevailed. The trip was a very pleasant one, several entertainments being organized on board. Last Thursday evening a dance was held and last night a very enjoyable concert was given.

The checking of the passengers by the immigration department, after the vessel reached port this morning, delayed passengers from coming ashore, as there was some difficulty in getting through the list.

TENDERS FOR BEEF CATTLE.

Sealed tenders, in duplicate, endorsed "TENDERS FOR BEEF CATTLE," will be received at the office of the Board of Health, until 12 o'clock, noon, Tuesday December 20th, 1910, for supplying the Leper Settlement, Molokai, with beef cattle for the period of six months from January 1st, 1911, to June 30, 1911, under the following conditions, namely:

1. The bidder must offer to furnish "at beef cattle to weigh not less than 350 lbs. net when dressed, in lots averaging about 60 head per month, more or less, as may be specified by the Superintendent of the Leper Settlement, delivered at the Leper Settlement, Molokai, and to accept the dressed weights ascertained at the Leper Settlement. For further information apply at the office of the Board of Health, Honolulu.
2. Hides, tallow and offal to be the property of the Board of Health.
3. Each bid must be for the price per pound dressed weight, with an alternative offer of the price per head.
4. The successful bidder must agree that all cattle are offered for delivery subject to the right of the Superintendent of the Leper Settlement to reject any or all unfit for use in which event other cattle must be forthwith furnished to make up the required number and those rejected forthwith removed at the expense of the bidder.

All bids must be submitted in accordance with, and subject to, the provisions and requirements of Act 62, Session Laws 1909. Tenders must be accompanied by certified check equal in amount to 5 per cent. of the tender on the basis of 60 head per month, or 60 head per month weighing net, when dressed, 350 pounds each.

1. Tenders to be for the price per bundle of paiai weighing twenty-five (25) pounds net. The paiai to be freshly made and securely packed in ti leaves and delivered in good condition at the Leper Settlement, Molokai.
2. Tenders to be based on the supply of 900 to 1000 paiai per month to be delivered as ordered by the Superintendent and the supply to begin with the first week of January, 1911.
